**LABOR ORGANIZER TALKS TO UNIONS**

**C. O. Young Spoke On Unionism Last Night Advocating Organization**

A fair sized audience greeted C. O. Young at the Union Labor hall last evening when he gave his second talk on labor conditions, and the aims and ambitions of labor organizations.

When labor is not organized, declared Mr. Young, they are subject to what the man above wants to give them. As far as organization is concerned, the object is for three things, more pay, better hours and better working conditions. The shortening of business or working hours was regarded by the speaker as one of the most significant things attached to the labor movement. Short hours make better pay, give a man more ambition to amount to something and, also, gives him a chance to become acquainted with his family. Men who work the longest hours get the least pay. In opposition to the open shop, Mr. Young claimed that an open shop meant a non-union shop, and that a man who advocates an open shop, is against the union. Referring to complete organization, he referred to the railway conductors who are over 99 per cent organized, and that in the regular railroad service, a man could not be discharged without cause. He was of the opinion that labor had made a great advancement when the courts decided that men have the right to strike, and had the right to stay any place if they did not trespass. As to the employees of the Ford automobile company, Mr. Young would have much preferred that the men get the \$5 a day by demanding it, rather than taking additional pay as a gift from Mr. Ford. Among other ideas suggested by the speaker was, that no strike was ever lost, that non-union men are getting better pay because of the union, and that the hardest thing for labor to overcome is the lack of interest shown by the women.

In paying his respects to the school teachers for not organizing and joining the labor union, Mr. Young said that an ordinary hod carrier was paid better than the average teacher, and that they would never receive adequate wages until organized.

"I have no political faith," said Mr. Young, "but will go in any direction to secure better laws for the laboring men." He referred to the new law passed by congress, giving the seaman a right to leave a ship when living conditions are intolerable. Heretofore, if a seaman left his ship, he could be legally taken back, regardless of conditions on the ship.

As a means of furthering the union, he suggested that women do their part and they could easily accomplish much by demanding articles with the union trade label. But the greatest advance made in recent years, was the ruling in an article of commerce.

In the hall of labor and talking direct to laboring men, Mr. Young is more at home and a better and a more forcible orator than when speaking in a church.

Preceding the address of the evening, Gus W. Kramer, president of the Salem Trades and Labor Council, gave an interesting talk on labor conditions and what labor hoped to accomplish.

Hanson, district sealer of weights and measures, who has been in Eugene for a week past correcting existing mistakes in scales used in various branches of business, has discovered that the scales at a hop yard between Eugene and Springfield are wrong and the pickers have been "over-weighted."

Mr. Hanson cited the owners of the yard to appear before him Saturday night and they were told that they must pay the pickers for the over-weight that has been charged up to them. The sealer also found that these men were deducting from the weight of each sack of hops, two pounds for the sack, whether it weighed that much or not. He laid down a rule for them to follow that the total weight of 40 or 50 sacks shall be ascertained and in deducting from the total weight of a sack of hops, the average weight of these sacks should be the prevailing figure.

Mr. Hanson has examined 14 public gasoline pumps in Eugene and has found all but four of them to be giving short measure, each from one pint to one pint. These pumps have been corrected and the owners warned to keep them in condition hereafter.
