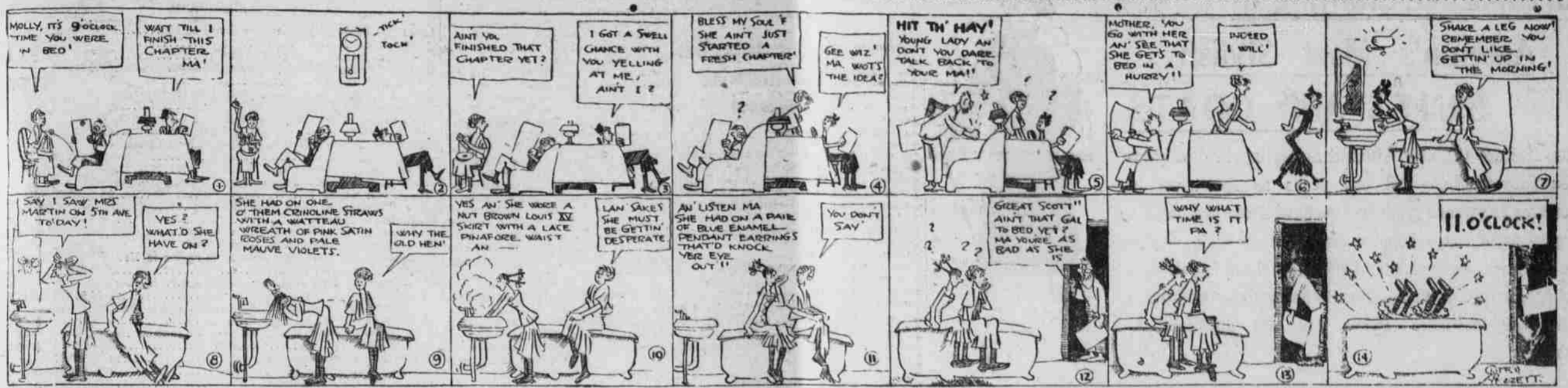

New York, Sept. 8.—An explosion in the new subway near the building where \$80,000,000 in English gold was temporarily stored, threw fifty armed guards into a fever of excitement here today. The guards were placed about the vast fortune of gold to prevent any possible attempt at robbery and with the explosion it was feared an effort was being made to reach the treasure. Later the gold was transferred to the vaults of J. P. Morgan & Co. The \$80,000,000 was moved through the streets in automobile trucks.
