Although wheat is worth, from a standpoint of the Portland market, 75 cents in Salem, there is very little selling. One small lot was sold here yesterday for 72 cents, but the grade was rather inferior.

Prices paid for oats vary. While most of the dealers regard 30 and 32 cents the market price, others regard 35 cents about right, although there is no buying at that figure.

Flour was off this morning 20 cents a barrel, but no changes have been made yet locally.

Poultry is still slow sale, with the Portland market 11 cents. Eggs are now on the established price of 30 cents a dozen.

Find Apple Markets Injured by Poor Fruit

Cooperative Organizations of Producers - The Best Agencies for Profitable Disposition, Says Government Report.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 22.—Effective co-operative organizations afford the best means for profitable marketing of the country's increasing apple crop, according to a survey of marketing conditions in the industry just published as bulletin No. 302, "Apple Market Investigations 1914-15" by the United States Department of Agriculture.

In this connection it is said that the grade and package laws now in operation in a number of states are proving effective in stabilizing the market.

The effect of the war upon the industry has been found to be less disastrous than was apprehended. Because of the cheapness of the fruit, consumption was stimulated until the exports far exceeded expectations.

Lambs are brabbed up quickly at \$7, ewes at \$5 and wethers at \$5.50. The packers can easily handle many more sheep than have been coming in; receipts for today totaled to about \$4.25 head.
