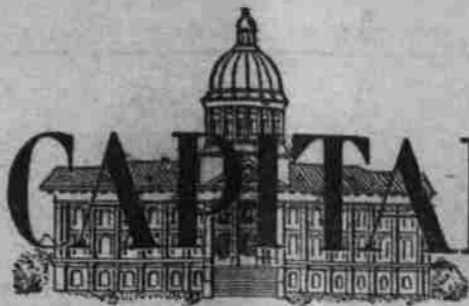


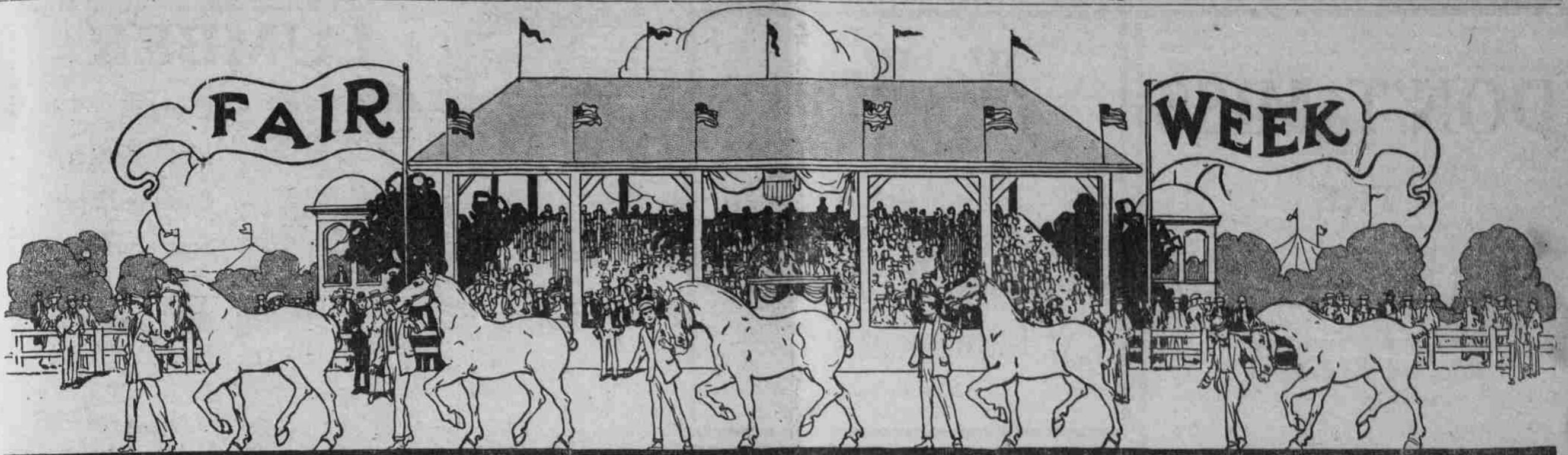

The fifty-third annual state fair opened this morning with the usual fair weather and the flood of humanity that rang up fares, the turnstiles scattered out to the machinery exhibit, the livestock barns, the industrial exhibit and thronged through the new pavilion which was jammed full of agricultural and varied industrial exhibits. The open air and free features were improved for this year and H. E. Munter is scheduled to make daily flights in his aeroplane during the fair. If the conditions for starting and landing are favorable Munter will even take up a lady passenger, so he says, and some of Salem's fair sex may be given a chance to look over the city from the point of view of the bird.

Today is children's day and the youngsters under 14 are admitted free and not a few took advantage of the two bit reduction because they will be obliged to contribute a quarter tomorrow unless they can convince the gate-man that they are under 10 years of age. As usual there were some of the exhibitors who had been to other fairs and had not yet placed their booth in final shape but by tomorrow the fair will be running in all of its glory.

One department, however, was all there and the largest ever collected in the history of the Oregon state fair, that is the livestock department. There are 650 cattle, 300 horses, 250 swine, 275 sheep, and two herds of goats, all sleek and proud whether they low,

neigh, bleat or grunt. The cattle exhibit is showing Shorthorns, Herefords, Holsteins, Polled Angus, Red Polled, Brown Swiss, Guernseys, and Jerseys. In the Jersey line almost any breed is shown as there are over 20 exhibitors. The Standard bred horses include American carriage horses, saddle horses, high school, Shetlands, roadsters, and French Coach, German coach, Hackneys, Pucheron, Belgian, English Shires, Clydesdales and also a fine exhibit of mules it was out on parade this morning.

The sheep entries are Shropshires, Dorset Horns, Hampshire, Southdowns, Oxford downs, Cotswolds, and Lincoln. The swine are Durocs, Berkshire, Poland Chinas, Chester Whites, Yessox, Hampshire, and a herd of Tamworth from Farrago, Iowa, exhibited by J. B. Mackey, J. E. McCelp of Monmouth, has also begun answering a never ending string of questions about his mule footed hogs.

The races proved to be the principal attraction this afternoon and although the track was heavy the races were started promptly at 1:30. The officials are: Starter, W. P. McNair, Douglas, Ariz.; Judges, H. W. Hatch, Salem, Richard Kiger, of Corvallis, and N. K. West of Union. Timers: Dr. Charlton, Portland, Ed Fortune, Oregon City, Leon Davidson, Salem. W. B. (Synopsis). In this piece the well known air "The Wearin' o' the Green" is used as the basis for a number of variations in which both the reed and brass instruments are successfully employed. The theme is followed by a paraphrase which in turn gives place to a solo for horn and clarinet (in the minor). This is succeeded by a solo for bassoon after which the melody is treated as a "Hot Dance," next as an interlude on the oboe and then as chorale. The piccolo follows with a variation which is taken up by the basses, and concluded by the cornets. A short andante paraphrase leads to the concluding movement in which the air is treated as a popular march a-la-Sousa.
