Fairgrounds Tented City Shows Increase This Year

The fairgrounds tented city is really a bigger city than the average person would imagine. By actual count and record, the city this year is made up of 435 tents, 27 cottages, 6 covered wagons, and 4 autos for camping, making a total of 472 homes in the city. Figuring an average of five to a family, this would give a population of 2360. But this does not include the actual number that are entertained in the city, as at times the population is almost double the number of regular campers. Superintendent Albert Tozier estimates the size of the tented city at several hundred larger than a year ago with about 50 more tents. To the average family who comes camping for the week, the expense amounts to about \$20.

With the exception of Des Moines, Iowa, and Hamline, midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis, the tented city here is the largest state fair city of its kind in the country. Des Moines got several of its ideas from this state, and soon found it would have to enlarge its grounds, until now the state has 71 acres reserved for the campers each year. The eighteen acres belonging to the state here will soon be inadequate, if the city continues to grow. The largest attendance in the history of the camp, was in the year 1876. In the early days when there was but few railroad facilities, the people from all over the state came to the fair and camped out for a week. It was the time when relatives and friends had their annual meeting. Most of them went to Portland for their winter's trading and purchasing of supplies, and then returned for a week's visit at the state fair.
