FALLS 28 FEET AND LIVES

While Ole Severson was engaged last Thursday in helping to fill a new silo recently completed by J. H. Engeman on his ranch near this city, he took a 28-foot fall, and although being rendered unconscious by the fall for a time, escaped without breaking any bones and is again apparently as well as ever. Mr. Severson is a man over 65 years of age. It seems that it was the custom of Mr. Engeman to put up a long ladder for the men to come down on, but Mr. Severson wanted to get down without the aid of a ladder, and while trying to swing himself down with a rope to a staging which was six feet from the top of the silo, the rope came untied and threw him to the ground below. In his flight downward he struck the corner of a chicken coop and almost wrecked the building. He rolled to the ground unconscious. Dr. Keene was immediately called, examined the man and found that no bones were broken. Within a short time after the accident he got up and walked to an automobile and was taken home. —Silverton Appeal.

Frederick Warde



IN the lectures of the distinguished actor, author and lecturer, Frederick Warde, there are presented to the thinking people of America discourses which cannot fail to be of lasting benefit to the age. The last of a distinguished group of Shakespearean actors, of which the Booths, John McCullough, Lawrence Barrett, Harry Sullivan and Thomas Keene were members, Mr. Warde brings to the platform a personality whose attractiveness is undiminished by the flight of years and out of the fullness of a lifetime spent in the study of Shakespearean role gives a lecture recital which meets the highest requirement of histrionic art.

The purpose of Mr. Warde's recitals is to encourage and simplify the study of Shakespeare, to remove the mistaken impression of profundity and obscurity and illustrate the beauty of his poetry, the depth of his philosophy and the universality of his knowledge. He is the absolute master of his art, and his lecture-recitals are beautiful word pictures which create a profound impression wherever given.

Mr. Warde abandoned the stage because he would not prostitute his talents to the vitiated taste of the day, and his platform work is the effort of a great student and thinker to overcome the tendency of the times and to save that which is finest and best in dramatic art.
