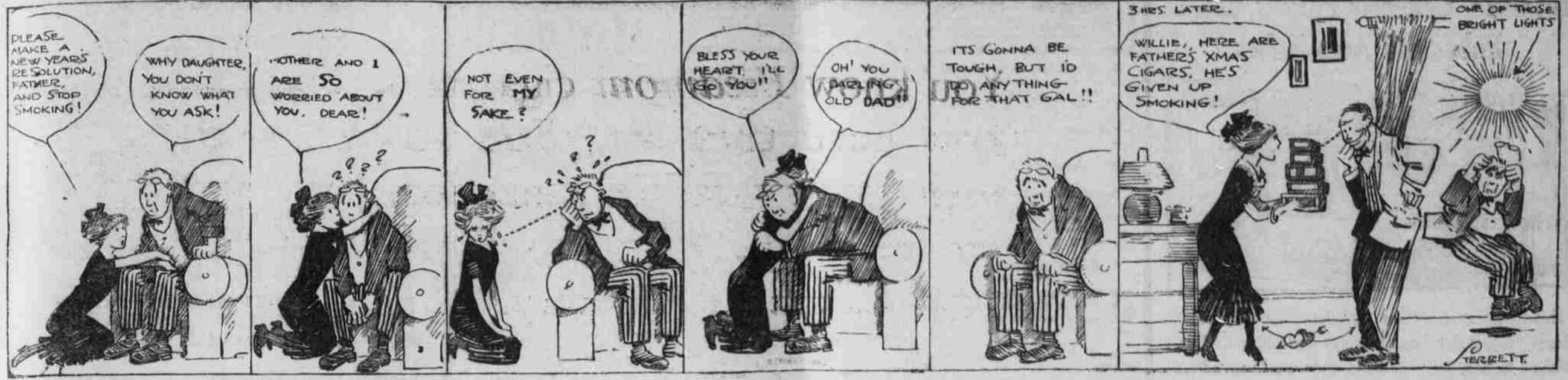

THE MARKETS

STATE NEWS

Penitentiary Tribune: Professor J. C. Heeney, who is lecturing at the Temple theatre on the convict ship "Success" today, was recently charged by the Panjathes circuit to go over the Canadian territory with his pictures and lecture.

On arrival at Vancouver the censor board refused to allow him permission to show, claiming that the exhibition of such a black page in English history would have the effect of retarding the campaign for recruits which is now being vigorously carried on in Canada.

Gold Hill News: Laying the ghost of fish poisoning at the Golden Drift dam has been revealed into a scientific art—worthy of Craig Kennedy, Thomas A. Edison or Fred Eddings. Henceforth the poacher who would take salmon and steelhead below the dam at night must face the white glare of a 1500 candle-power searchlight. Shipped by the fish and game commission for this purpose, the light will be installed by the Rogue River Public Service corporation, owners of the dam, in a position where its rays will constantly command the river at night and prevent the approach of poachers.

Medford Mail-Tribune: Regulation of trains whistling in the city limits will be considered at the next meeting of the city council. The S. P. sends out a flagman, who walks down the track and stands with a red flag in his hand to halt any approaching train from the rear. When it is time to depart, the engineer blows the whistle to call him in. As the blasts are all healthy shrieks, they frighten horses by day and wake people up at night. The council thinks a more quiet method should be employed to let the brakeman flagman know it is time to get aboard.

PORTER CHARLTON IS NERVOUS FACING COURT

(United Press Staff Correspondent) Come, Italy, Oct. 6.—His fingers twitching nervously, his face showing the pallor of almost five years in prison, Porter Charlton today answered in court for beating his wife, the beautiful Mary Scott Castle, of California, to death in their bungalow here, and throwing her body into lake Como in a trunk. Deep lines showed across his forehead and his eyes were circled. Between two stalwart carabinieri he was ushered into the iron prisoners' cage and then the guardsmen stood at the entry. The session today was largely devoted to preliminaries concerning his age, and routine questions. All questions he answered in excellent Italian, which language he learned in an Italian prison. The little court room was crowded with villagers, many in picturesque costume.
