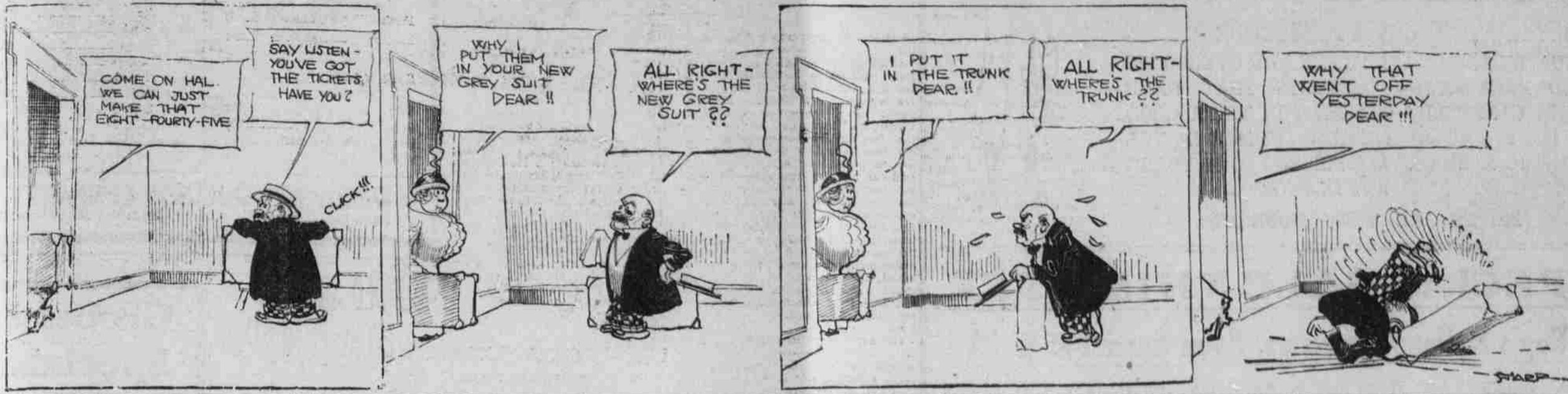

In Chicago Market

Chicago, Oct. 7.—Repetition of yesterday's buying, starting from Wall street investors, started wheat today on another sharp advance. May opened at 108 1/2 and sold at 110 within five minutes. Profit taking caused the market to close at a lower level than the opening. May wheat was quoted at 106 3/8, and December at 105 3/8.
