WILLAMETTE DRUBS ALBANY COLLEGE BY SCORE OF 7 TO 3

Long Punts of French, of Albany, Keep Ball From Dangerous Territory

The Willamette football team scored its first non-conference triumph Saturday afternoon when the Albany college team was taken down the field for a touchdown while Albany was negotiating a single drop kick and the final score was 7 to 3.

The first quarter of the game was an even break, with neither side able to make any substantial gains through the line. In the second quarter, Albany brought the ball to the 40 yard line and tried a place kick but failed.

French tried a few minutes later from the 20 yard line and the ball sailed through the posts for three points.

Willamette was seriously handicapped by the loss of Tiell, the speedy full-back, and with French, the Albany punter, booting the ball for 40 and 50 yard spirals the locals were unable to gain any material advantage until the last quarter when a 40 yard run by Irvin and another by Archibald brought the ball down within striking distance and a forward pass, Flegel to Archibald, scored a touchdown.

In the last half of the game the superior physical condition of the Willamette team was apparent and the boys began tearing off good gains but the long kicks of French kept the ball from the goal line.

A preliminary game was played between the Salem high school team and the Albany which was won by the high school by a single touchdown. This was made at the end of the third quarter when the high school backs backed the ball over on line snatches. The lineup:

Coach Lietz' men played Oregon off their feet in the first of the game, scoring a touchdown after six minutes of play. Doane, the 157-pound full back of the state college, was the bright and shining light of the back field, carrying the ball in two out of three plays when he was in the game.

Dietz, Bangs and Durham all made yardage consistently. The old line plunging game was used mostly by both sides, but few passes being attempted. Zimmerman of state college intercepted a forward pass from Heckett toward Cornell and ran 70 yards for a touchdown at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

Oregon's only score came in the last of the second quarter, when Huntington made a place kick from the 20-yard line. Cornell replaced Montesta in the fourth quarter, but Oregon could not make consistent gains against the light state college line.
