**FALLS 1800 FEET AND DROWNS IN BAY**  
San Diego, Cal., Oct. 11.—One of the saddest of the many fatal aeroplane accidents occurring since the establishment of the United States aviation camp at North Island, took place at 11:15 a. m. today when Lieutenant Walter K. Tallafiero, while looping the loop in Curtiss tractor number 20, fell 1800 feet into the bay and was drowned. Up to a late hour today Lieutenant Tallafiero's body had not been found.  
Lieutenant Tallafiero who was married in this city on April 29 of this year to Miss Leicester Schon, daughter of the late Captain John L. Schon, was strapped to his seat at the time of the accident. The unfortunate birdman disappeared beneath the water about half a mile north of the North Island camp, towards Point Loma, and although divers were rushed from the U. S. S. San Diego, they were unable, after continued search, to locate the wrecked machine.  
As his brother birdmen watched and applauded from below today the jauntless flier looped the loop, but as he completed the circle it was seen that he was unable to right himself. He dropped 800 feet in an effort to do this, but at a height of more than 1000 feet from the water lost all control of the tractor. The great machine saut as so much dead weight into the bay and disappeared immediately with its brave driver.  
Officers at the North Island camp hurriedly telephoned to San Diego for an ambulance and pulmotor and the officers of the U. S. S. San Diego, who had witnessed the accident, dispatched a power boat containing skilled divers for the spot where the machine sank.  
Lieutenant Tallafiero was born in Kentucky, December 8, 1880 and was 35 years old. He was appointed second lieutenant from the "army" having worked his way up through the ranks. He joined the 21st infantry as record lieutenant, August 29, 1908, and entered the aviation corps at North Island July 23, 1914.

**SCRAPPING IS LIGHT ON RUSSIAN FRONT**  
Petrograd, Oct. 11.—Operations in the Riga region and from Dvinsk to Pripet are deadlocked, it was officially reported today. About Riga, the official statement reported, the Teuton forces "displayed no activity" while from Dvinsk to the Pripet, "nothing of importance occurred."  
South of the Pripet, enemy forces captured the village of Bereznarid Volia. Near Ciartorisik, they crossed to the right bank of the Styr. The war office claimed that the Slavs put to flight enemy cavalry in the Bukovina region which had charged "like an avalanche."  
Considerable activity by German birdmen was reported. Garbovka has fallen into the Germans' hands. The statement told of Russian penetration of Teuton trenches in the district north of Livovitch in a night attack. More than 200 Germans fell before the Slavs' bayonets, and a number of prisoners were taken.  
Field Marshal von Hindenburg continues to wrest scattering positions from the Slavs around Dvinsk.  
Two Russian torpedo boats destroyed 19 Turkish sailing vessels off the Anatolian coast since Thursday. The wrecked ships were laden with munitions.

**COURT HOUSE NEWS**  
Sheriff Esch returned to this city last night from Walker, a small station on the Southern Pacific South of Creswell in Lane county, with Noel Wolfard in custody. Wolfard is charged with a criminal assault alleged to have been committed upon the person of a 15 year old girl on Howell Prairie. He was arrested on a bench warrant which was issued by Judge Kelly as soon as the grand jury returned a true bill in the case.  
The case of C. D. Fuels against William Pstak was resumed in the circuit court this morning after the over-Sunday rest. This case was started Friday morning at 9 o'clock and promises to occupy most of today before the verdict is returned. This is an action brought to recover damages for alleged fraud in a real estate trade. Both sides allege fraud on the part of the other and both claim damages.  
Rosie Stewart has brought suit for a divorce against John Stewart alleging cruel and inhuman treatment and gross intoxication. The couple were married in Washington in 1902 and have one child, a son, John Stewart, aged 12 years. The plaintiff asks for the care and custody of the child and a suitable allowance from the defendant to provide for the care of the boy. Carey P. Martin is attorney for the plaintiff.  
C. E. Burnett was arrested by Sheriff Esch yesterday and lodged in the county jail on a charge of illicit liquor selling. Burnett was indicted by the county grand jury on the same charge for which he pleaded guilty in municipal court and paid a fine of \$75. He was also indicted on a charge of selling his loganberry cider which it is alleged contains more than the legal amount of alcohol.  
A marriage license was issued today at the office of the county clerk to Melvin Gildow, a farmer of Aumsville, and Anna May Galer, also of Aumsville.  
Mrs. Rosa Willing was today appointed guardian of her 10 year old son, Leo Willing, by an order issued by County Judge Bushey. It is stated in the petition that the minor is possessed of property in the state of Ohio valued at \$200.
