It is claimed that the process used on prunes is the only one of its kind in the state. The methods of packing are sanitary, and the work will go on as usual during the afternoon while the visitors are being taken through the plant. The new building is located at the corner of Trade and Cottage streets two blocks south of the postoffice.

A contract station of the postoffice department will be established next Friday, at the Crown Drug company, 332 State street. This station is established for the convenience of downtown patrons and its business is confined to selling stamps, writing money orders and registering letters. In a contract station, no parcel post packages will be weighed, or received. In a station, like the one to be established in the Crown Drug store, no extra force is put in to handle the business, and those in the store do not come under the head of the classified service. Those with parcel post packages to be weighed or mailed, or postage estimated will do their business at the postoffice.
