Charges of Murder Stir McMinnville

McMinnville, Or., Oct. 14.—Salem has this section of Oregon been so stirred as it was today over the arrest of William Branson, 22, and Mrs. William Booth, 39, in connection with the murder of the woman's husband last Friday at Willamina. Booth was shot to death.

Following a preliminary hearing at Willamina yesterday at which it developed that Booth had accused his wife of undue intimacy with young Branson, both were being held in the jail here awaiting the action of the grand jury.

Branson is charged with the actual commission of the crime and Mrs. Booth with being an accomplice. Both prisoners are members of pioneer families. Mrs. Booth is the mother of four children.
