**CAPTAIN PAUL HOFER TO PLAY WITH AGGIES**  
Salem Boy To Play In Game Against Washington State Team Tomorrow

(Capital Journal Special Service.) Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 15.—News that Ex-Captain Hofer, the Salem member of the Beaver football team, will be able to go into the game tomorrow, has brought cheer to the supporters of the local team. Tomorrow's game with the strong Washington State squad that a week ago drubbed Oregon 24 to 3 will be perhaps the most critical game in the conference series as far as the two contending teams are concerned. Not any too much confidence in the home team has been expressed by the coaches or felt by the followers of the game and the fact that "Gloomy Gus" will appear for the first time this season in a conference game has done much to brighten the Aggie prospects. The intelligibility against "Hungry" Smith and Thompson have been removed so that the line should be even stronger than it was last Saturday when it held the Whitman team almost powerless.

On the other hand Cole, the most dependable kicker on the team, is out with a bad knee and may be able to get into the game at all, and Loe, a hard plunging fullback, is also out with an injured tendon. The lineup of the team will be as follows: Ends, Moist and Schuster; tackles, Laythe and Smith; guards, Anderson, Hofer and Cole; center, Bissett and Yeager; halves, Captain Billie, Abraham, Newman and Dutton; fullbacks, Loe, Hoerline, and Allworth.

The local field is perhaps the best in the entire conference and with the favorable weather and intense interest in the game, one of the hardest and most interesting struggles ever seen on the Northwest conference football field is expected.

**Salem Egg Circle Proves A Success**

The Salem Egg Circle by shipping eggs that are absolutely fresh to markets in Portland and Seattle that demand a high grade of egg, is able to net its members from two to three cents more a dozen than the local market, according to Sherrill Fleming, secretary of the circle, and who has charge of the receiving and shipping. Organized several months ago, the circle has gradually increased its membership and developed a business that is proving profitable. During the month of October, an amount of the security of eggs, the circle has been able to sell in its special markets for 39 cents a dozen. A circle will soon be organized at Dallas, and with Corvallis and Lebanon, will ship direct to Salem as a central shipping point.

It is the intention of Professor Lamb to continue to organize these circles in the Willamette valley, and while comparatively new in this state, they have been in successful operation in many of the eastern states and Canada. It is estimated that in New Jersey, fully 80 per cent of the eggs are distributed through these circles.

The local office is in the building of the Salem Fruit Union, and now that the business has assumed larger proportions, the secretary is devoting all his time to the business.


W. C. Privet is confined to his bed with a severe attack of the grippe.

**SUFFRAGE CAMPAIGN IN NEW JERSEY HOT**

**Last Week of Campaign Is Filled With Parades and Street Meetings**

Trenton, N. J., Oct. 15.—Suffragettes and anti-suffragettes today entered upon the last lap of several weeks of hot campaigning before Tuesday's special suffrage election. The suffrage workers are confident. They count on outlying districts to offset any losses in the densely populated counties where factories, with many foreign workers, mostly men, wield the balance of power.

The women have been assisted in their campaign by several auto loads of New York speakers, who have today addressed big throngs at street corners from their machines.

The "anti's" will virtually end their campaign tomorrow night with a big mass meeting here. Not to be outdone, the "pro's" will hold a series of street meetings outside the hall, and they predict the "overflow" will be as great as or greater than the inside session.

So bitter is the campaign that the suffragists fear illegal voting will be attempted at some points to defeat the cause, and hence they are taking extra precautions.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 15.—Broken financially and in spirit and unable to raise \$3,500 bail required by the state for his release, H. H. **OLD BOARD HOLDS ON**

North Yakima, Wash., Oct. 15.—Although recalled by an overwhelming vote, the old county commissioners today claim they are legally in office until their successors qualify, and as the new board appointed by the governor has not yet organized, county business is at a standstill. The surety company of the county treasurer has instructed him to pay no warrants under either regime until the situation is cleared up, if necessary, by the courts. The new board consisting of Commissioners Coumbe, Dimnick and Freeman are to organize tomorrow.

**GERMAN WAR FILMS FROM BATTLE FRONT**

Moving pictures actually taken on the battle front, showing both the Germans and their opponents in action, are included in the German war pictures which come to the Grand theatre beginning today (Friday).

The moving picture operator who went into battle like the other soldiers of the Kaiser's armies, stood right on the firing line and took his one chance in a million against being shot. The films he brought back give the best evidence yet brought to America of just what the war is in reality. To view them is to sit and have the battle unfold before you in marvellous clearness and detail.

Trench life, trench fighting, cavalry charges, bombardment of forts, field artillery in action, Germans on the advance and in retreat, French soldiers in retreat, falling walls, crumbling forts—all this and much more is included in the pictures. With armed soldiers the moving picture man cut his way through barbed wire entanglements and took pictures on the way. He went into battle with the others and in some cases was among the few to return. The German war pictures are vivid and realistic. They are being shown in America for their educational as well as their entertaining value.

As an evidence of how close the camera was to the fighting, included in the films are some captured from a French moving picture outfit of which the operator was killed. The camera was picked up later and some of the films had been riddled with bullets.

Falling walls of the stricken Belgian cities, crumbling fortifications of the Namur and Liege forts; the field hospitals of cavalry horses and their men in a charge and numberless other hair-raising details are shown. Not the least interesting is some close views of trench fighting. By many who have seen them, the pictures are said to be the most marvellous yet brought over from the war zone.

**To Hold Examinations For Government Jobs**

In several examinations to be held in Seattle during October and November, by the civil service commission, but one is open to women, that of assistant librarians, which pays, when first entering the service, a salary of \$60 a month.

Examinations will be held October 29 for junior telephone and telegraph engineer with a salary attached of \$230 to \$1800 a year and also for forest ranger, whose salary from the first service is placed at \$1100. The average book student would have but little chance of successfully passing the civil service of forest ranger as a practical knowledge of woodcraft, camping and packing for long hikes over mountains is necessary.

Assistants in dry land arboriculture are wanted, and for those who can qualify, the salary is \$75 a month, with a gradual increase until a maximum of \$1500 is reached. From the government's view, a timber inspector is worth \$4.78 a day, while a library assistant only draws down \$2 for a day's work, which is also the amount paid for wireless telegraphers.

Civil service examinations for other government positions will be held in Seattle, and any one desiring of taking a chance, can receive information from postmaster Buckstein.

**Bellingham Woman Seeks Her Niece, Elsie Bacus**

Mrs. Susan Bell, of Bellingham, Washington, has written to Chief of Police Wells of this city that her niece, Miss Elsie Bacus, is somewhere in Salem or vicinity and alone since the death of the girl's father, Isaac Bacus, about six months ago. The letter states that there is another aunt of the young woman in Bellingham and they wish to provide the girl with a home since she is now without parents as her mother died 18 years ago.

The police have searched all of the records of the city and have run down every possible clue that would lead to the girl, but so far have been unable to locate her. The letter to the police says that the father of the girl wrote regularly up until about three years ago and then his letters ceased but they have received the information that Isaac Bacus died in this city earlier in this year.
