Make Good Brides But Poor Mothers

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 14.—Native daughters of California and other American born women in this state are not doing their full share in perpetuating the puritan blood, it appears from figures made public today by George D. Leslie, statistician for the state board of health.

These figures show that while the native born and American women of California are strong for marriage they are not strong for children. Although there are fewer brides proportionately among foreign born women than American women and native daughters in the state, the proportion of births to the foreign born is considerably greater and is showing a steady increase.

The number of births to American born and native California brides and mothers is gradually falling off.
