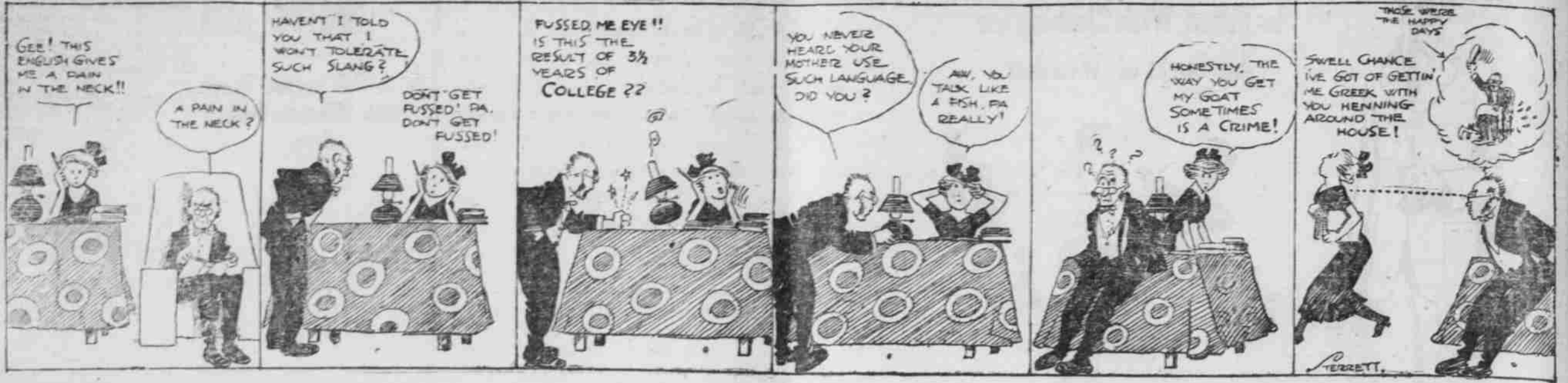

EVERYTHING READY FOR BIG MARKET DAY

Large Lot of Stock and Much Material Already Listed For Sale

Everything is now in readiness for the biggest market sales day ever held in Salem. According to those in charge, there isn't any doubt about it. Farmers have been sending their lists, the committee in charge has been doing extensive advertising, and hundreds of inquiries have been made at the Waring barn where the sale will take place.

Besides the varied assortment of farm implements and farm stock, there will be sold all kinds of farm produce and all kinds of vegetables. These will be sold at auction and will be on display before the sale, which is billed to start promptly at 9:30 o'clock in the

morning. In addition to the auction sales, the address of Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture of Alberta Province, is looked forward to with interest, as he is known as one of the really practical agricultural men of the north, who brings a real message. This address will take place in the armory, immediately following the auction sale, at 9 o'clock.

Up to this afternoon, the following had been entered, all of which will be put up at auction:

1. Buggy, carriage, surrey, harness.

10. Mowing machine and rake.

13. Nine month old heifer.
14. One working mare.

15. Five sacks of Burbank potatoes.

 17. Three boxes pears.
