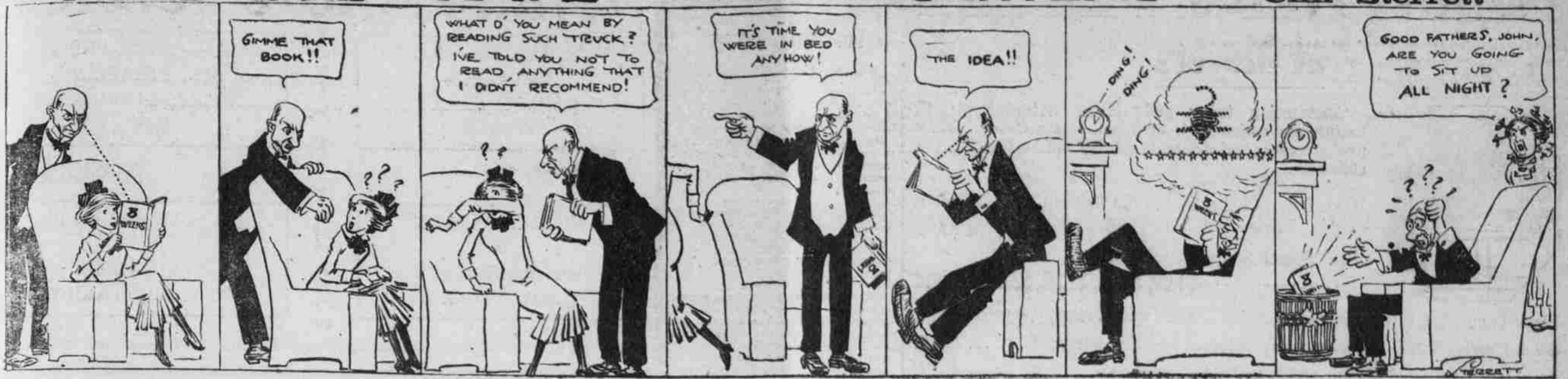

Oregon City Enterprise: Articles of incorporation of the Willamette Valley Flax company were filed with County Clerk Harrington Wednesday.

Albany Herald: That a large number of men are making from 75 cents to \$2.50 a day panning gold on the different forks of the Santiam was learned today from several who have just returned.

Baker Herald: To investigate conditions in the mail service in Eagle valley, Congressman N. J. Sinnott, of The Dalles, after a two days' visit in Baker, left for Pine and Eagle valleys this morning.

Corvallis Gazette-Times: Samuel B. Flowers, who erected the first steam sawmill operated in Benton county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary F. Pittsburgh, in Roseburg at 5:45 yesterday morning.

East Oregonian: An interesting incident of the horse and mule show here Saturday was the appearance of Rex, driving horse owned by the late Judge Thomas G. Halley and now by his nephew, Berkeley Halley, which 18 years or more ago won first prize in the single driving class, and which Saturday took first prize in that class once again.

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 16.—Both General Villa and General Pardo, his chief of staff, were reported dead in personal reports here today from Casas Grandes. There was no confirmation of either report. The story concerning Villa was that, after trouble with his troops he was fatally shot.

Washington, Oct. 16.—The Villa agency here today denied reports that General Villa had been killed. It was stated messages he sent last night came this forenoon.
