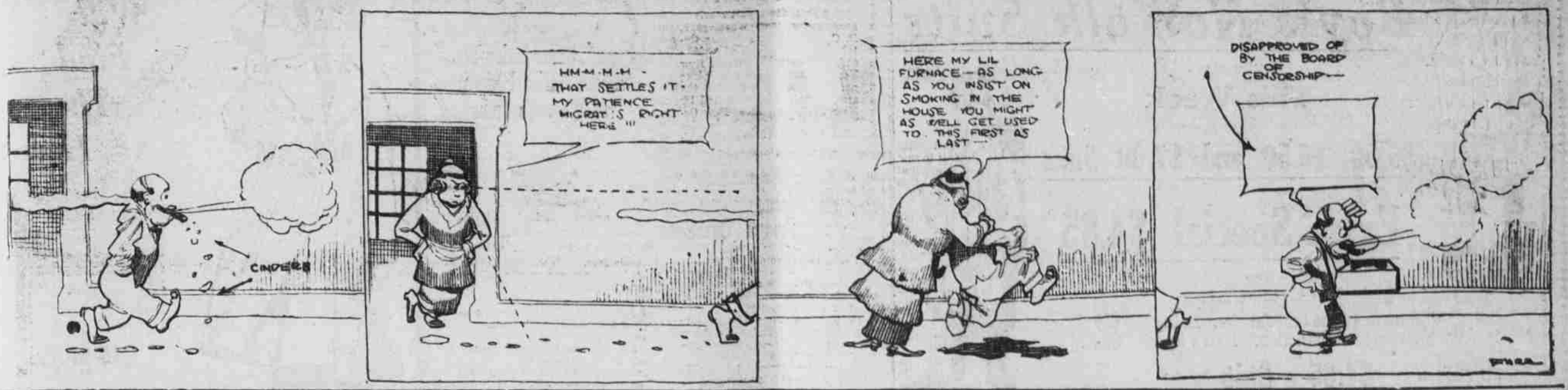

Escaped Officer May Be In Everett

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 27.—United States Immigration Inspector John H. Sargent and other federal officials are following a tip today that one of the German officers who escaped from the interned vessel Prinz Eitel Friedrich may be at Everett. A man answering a description of such an officer has been seen by M. A. Farrell, who immediately notified the authorities. The officer has been described in dispatches as a man of about 32 who has a scar extending from the lobe of his left ear to the mouth. The wound was received during a student duel in Germany.
