SALEM BANKS WILL NOT SUBSCRIBE TO EUROPEAN WAR LOAN

Find Plenty of Opportunities For Investment of Surplus At Home

In spite of the fact that Salem and Marion county banks have been flooded with letters, telegrams and attractive folders relative to war loans Marion county money will remain in this vicinity to aid in promoting the best interests of the community rather than being sent abroad according to the bankers of this city.

ways been to serve this vicinity to the fullest extent," said one of the most prominent bankers in the city today, "and while we have opportunities at home no efforts will be made to subscribe to foreign loans. The money that might be spent for bomb shells might be used to erect a few new buildings in Salem."

Since the Salem banks are probably the only banks in the county that are in position to subscribe to a foreign loan to any great extent it is safe to say that no Marion county coins will add to the finances needed for the struggle across the water. The war loans were underwritten in New York by the great banks in that city who depend upon the banks in other states to take up part of the loan in any quantity desired. Loans to all of the allied powers—and to Germany and Austria have been underwritten in New York and are now being offered to the smaller banks of the nation.

The proposal for the Italian loan came from a well known banking house of Chicago. This particular bond house is attempting to raise approximately \$50,000,000, and represents only a small part of the loan that is sought. According to the letters received by local bankers, Italy offers to pay five per cent interest on the loan, the same to be secured by government collateral. The Germans are also seeking a loan on terms even more flattering than offered by Italy. The German loan is for an unstated sum and is redeemable in the year 1924. Interest is at five per cent, payable each April and October, just as the Anglo-French loan. The bonds are offered at \$207 net for each 1000 marks. At this price the German bonds yield investors about eight per cent, with German exchange at normal rates, but because of the low rate at which German exchange is selling, the profit from an exchange basis alone is 10 per cent, the circular sets out. An example is cited of 1000 marks bond selling at existing exchange rates for \$850, while in ordinary times such a bond, equivalent to \$1000 in United States money, would cost \$950, showing an additional profit on exchange to the investor of \$102.

In the circular the national wealth of Germany is estimated at \$75,000,000,000, and the population at 70,000,000. "After the first year of the war the savings bank deposits of the German people were greater than before the war began, and are stated to amount to 20,000,000,000 marks," the circular

says. It is not thought probable that any of the war bonds will be taken by Salem people, although they are admitted by local capitalists to be a good and safe investment.

Young Girl Walks From Denver Through Capitals

Miss Phyllis Skrehot, who left Denver, Colo., January 11, of this year, to make a visit of all the state capitals, arrived in Salem yesterday and improved her time last night by selling Capital Journals on the street. A girl "newsie" is a novelty in Salem but Miss Skrehot started out to make her own way on the trip and to improve her health. She started out with a donkey and a cart but at Ashland traded her outfit for a pony.

She covered 2,565 miles to San Francisco where she remained two months before starting north. From Olympia she will go to Boise and to Salt Lake and hopes to reach the middle west this winter.

King George Hurt By Fall From Horse

London, Oct. 29.—King George is suffering from severe bruises due to a fall from his horse, according to official announcement today. The king is confined to his bed, but he passed a fair night, his physicians stated. His temperature is 99.2 and his pulse 76.

The accident occurred yesterday while the king was inspecting the army in the field in northern France. His mount, excited by the cheers of the troops, reared and fell, throwing the king off.

For the present, he must remain in bed, but his physicians gave assurance that no complications are expected.

COMMERCIAL CLUB TAKES STAND ON RATES

Declares That Attempt To Get Preferential Rates "Is Unfriendly Act."

According to a resolution passed at the meeting of the Commercial club Wednesday evening, any efforts on the part of the Portland Lumbermen's association, or the efforts of any other body, to gain a preferential freight rate over points in the Willamette valley, will be looked upon as deliberately unfriendly.

The efforts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce to secure a lumber rate into California, equal to that of points in the center and southern part of the valley was the cause of this resolution being introduced. The resolution in full is as follows:

Whereas, The lumber industry is one of the largest in the Willamette valley, and that the pay roll is said business in and near the city of Salem, is approximately \$15,000 per month, and

Whereas, The welfare and prosperity of this community is largely dependent upon the continued and successful operation of the lumber industry in the Willamette valley, and

Whereas, Until June 21, 1915, there was a differential rate of 2 1-2 cents (per 100 pounds) in favor of Portland mills and against the Willamette valley mills on all shipments of lumber to Utah points, and

Whereas, It is a shorter haul from Willamette valley mills to points in northern California and into Utah, than from Portland, Oregon, over the Southern Pacific Railroad company line, and

Whereas, The Portland Lumbermen's association and others within the city of Portland are attempting to have re-established a differential rate in favor of Portland mills in disparagement of the Willamette valley mills, and

Whereas, The city of Portland is only one part of the body politic of the state of Oregon, and the welfare and growth and continued prosperity of the city of Portland is dependent upon the growth, advancement and prosperity of the state of Oregon, now therefore be it

Resolved, By the Commercial club of the city of Salem, Marion county, Oregon, in general meeting assembled on this the 27th day of October, 1915, that any and all efforts of the Portland Lumbermen's association, or other body, or organ, to gain a preferential freight rate over other points within the state of Oregon, and particularly the Willamette valley, in interstate shipments of lumber, lumber products or other commodities, will be looked upon as deliberately unfriendly and in derogation of the welfare of the state at large, be it further

O. J. Rose Gets Five Years In Pen For Embezzling \$3,200

O. J. Rose, the man whose mind suddenly went blank in this city last spring and who was later identified as a refugee from justice, was sentenced to five years in the pen according to a letter received at the sheriff's office today from Deputy Sheriff T. A. Johnson, of Buchanan county, Missouri. Johnson was the deputy sent out to this state to return Rose to St. Joseph for trial. The trial lasted nine days and the jury returned a verdict of guilty October 22.

Rose made his escape with \$3,200 which he had drawn on drafts from a wholesale grocery house where he was employed and came to the Pacific coast after traveling through several European countries posing as a wealthy American tourist. His wife died of grief after he left St. Joseph, but Rose did not know of this until the deputy arrived here from St. Joseph to take the man in custody.

Rose, it will be remembered, arrived in Salem one night and after eating his breakfast the following morning his mind went blank and he did not even know his name when he was reported to the officers. He was taken to the receiving hospital for the asylum and the next morning about 2 o'clock he made his escape in his night clothes and, bare footed, made it across country to Gervais where he was captured and returned to the asylum. He recovered in a few days and was taken back to the county jail.

A SMALL EARTHQUAKE

Asheville, N. C., Oct. 29.—Two earthquake shocks, felt generally in this vicinity, early today aroused inhabitants from their sleep, but did no damage as far as reported this afternoon.

Convicted by Pals He Pleads Guilty

San Diego, Cal., Oct. 29.—Julia Garcia, aged 19, of this city, is out on probation today instead of fighting a charge of burglary. And the reason he is out, starting to keep a promise to behave a year, is that he was adjudged by a jury of alleged felons in the San Diego county jail. He had a regular trial in the "felony tank" with the 12 alleged felons acting as jurors, with another alleged felon sitting as judge and with others acting as his attorney and prosecutor.

Garcia had made a plea of not guilty at his preliminary examination.

When he entered the jail the fellow prisoners suggested that a mock trial should be held to see whether he should change the plea. He agreed and the trial was held, the case being based on the transcript of the proceedings at Garcia's preliminary examination. There was no joking, everything being carried out with judicial exactness. The jury soon declared Garcia guilty, and, with

out waiting to consult his attorney, he went before Judge Lewis and changed his plea. Then came a plea for probation. Garcia's father and friends said he had been a good boy and would behave if he had a good chance to turn over the leaf. And the judge gave him the chance.

Briand Is Forming New French Cabinet

Paris, Oct. 29.—Artistic Briand on whose shoulders falls the task of forming a new cabinet for France following resignations of the entire body, summoned candidates for portfolios for a meeting at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Meantime President Poincare formally accepted Premier Viviani's resignation and the entire cabinet went out with him. The invitation given to Briand yesterday to select a new group was formally extended today.

The crisis in the nation's affairs actually occurred yesterday, but for administrative reasons, Viviani asked that his retirement be delayed until today.
