**Servant Girl Admits the Child Was Hers**

Portland, Ore., Oct. 29.—Confessing that she is the mother of the newly born girl found, wrapped in a newspaper under a seat in a local moving picture house late Wednesday, but declaring that the infant was dead at birth, Miss Stanfania Fuchs, aged 23, an Austrian servant girl, is being detained by the police today.

A claim by Miss Fuchs that she is heir to an estate of \$10,000,000, left by a seafaring uncle who died seven months ago, has also caused her sister, Mrs. Max Scheibert, to swear out a warrant charging her with insanity.

Miss Fuchs was arrested in connection with the finding of the child's body through the suspicions of Miss Weaver, her landlady.

Miss Fuchs claims that she left the body in the theatre because she did not have the funds with which to give it burial.

**Liberty Bell To Start For Home**

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—San Francisco will relinquish its guardianship of the Liberty bell, November 11. All the formalities and reverence which marked its entrance into its temporary resting place in the Pennsylvania building at the Panama-Pacific exposition will mark its departure.

The special joint committee which accompanied the bell from Philadelphia will arrive November 9 for the return trip. The bell will be taken via the southern route, stopping among other places at Los Angeles and San Diego.

San Francisco will pay its fare well tribute to the Liberty bell on November 10, which will be "Liberty Bell Farewell day" at the exposition. Decked in wreaths, the bell will be taken from the Pennsylvania building to a point in front of the Tower of Jewels. An escort of United States marines, the exposition directorate, the joint Philadelphia committee, the local Liberty bell committee and 48 children representing the states of the Union will form a guard of honor.

Charles Seger, chairman of the joint Philadelphia committee, will preside and Governor Johnson, Mayor Rolph of San Francisco, and several distinguished foreign commissioners will speak November 11 an escort of soldiers, sailors and marines will accompany the bell to its special car.

**"No One To Blame" Say State Authorities**

Peabody, Mass., Oct. 29.—Less than a day after the fire in the St. Johns parochial school cost 22 children's lives, state authorities today completed their investigation into the holocaust, finding "none criminally responsible." Acting Chief George Neal of the state police, who announced the verdict, said the fire started from matches in boys' coats in a closet.

A public funeral service will be held in St. Johns church tomorrow within a stone's throw of the ruined school. Eleven coffins will be taken to church at 10:30 and the others an hour later.

Rev. Nicholas Murphy, who broke down yesterday, said he would conduct one service if he had to be carried from the altar.
