U. of O. and U. of W. Teams On Their Way to California

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 3.—Twenty-two strong, two men for every position, not one of them under 170 pounds in weight the University of Washington football team began its first invasion of California on the Santa Limited this morning. For the first time in his career as coach at Washington, Dobie, guiding hand of ten champion teams, is going in search of more worlds to conquer. Two hours after darkness fell on the Denny field, Dobie was busy with his squad last night behind locked gates. Dobie probably outlined the style of game he intends to use against California Saturday, but the information has not been given out. It will probably be an attack of forward passes based on straight football, with passes whenever the defensive backs are forced to come in to back up the tackles. That has been his style for years and it has been successful.

The team Dobie will pit against California will probably average close to 180. The lineup will be Hunt, Murphy, Abel and Smith, ends; Markham, Newton, Morrison and Elmer Leader, tackles; Wirt, Seagrave, and Vandebogart, guards; Loge and Cushman, centers; Young and Bronson, quarterbacks; Miller, Noble, Halves, Shiel and Hainsworth, fullbacks. The backfield will average 185 pounds.

The squad will have no chance to practice until Friday.

Left Eugene Today.
Eugene, Or., Nov. 3.—After a several days training handicapped by rain and a sea of mud the University of Oregon football team was ready to leave this afternoon for Los Angeles where the University of Southern California will be encountered Saturday.

The varsity boys were much encouraged over the condition of Monteith and Spillman, who were crippled in the Willamette game last Saturday. Both men may be able to play Saturday.

Coach Bezek was pleased with the team's showing in the practice, but admitted that the defensive work was not what he would like to have it.

Beckett will probably do most of the kicking against the Southern Californians, because of Monteith's injury.

California Feels Better.

University of California, Nov. 3.—Although acknowledging that California is practically certain of suffering defeat when it meets with Washington on Saturday, California students today were confident that the bears will not be defeated by more than 20 points.

The sudden turn from the wave of gloom which has spread the campus for several weeks is due to the changes which Coach Schaeffer has made in the varsity lineup.

California rooters believe the Washington aggregation is experiencing its first slump of the season. It is hoped California will get its real stride during the remainder of the week.

White Sox Program.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—The White Sox will start on their spring training trip three weeks later next spring than any previous season. According to President Comiskey, the Sox will leave here for Mineral Wells, Texas on March 10.

Lewis Gets Decision.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 3.—The decision given Ted Lewis, of England, over Milburn Saylor, of Milwaukee, was upheld generally by fans here today. Both lightweights mixed it all the way through the 12 rounds.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—Chicago's staff of athletic coaches will be augmented by Paul Des Jardien, upon his return from the Orient. He is now pitching for the Chicago university baseball team.

Villa Is Beaten, His Soldiers In Terrible Plight

(Continued From Page One.)

From a Villa staff officer it was learned that Villa attempted to discuss with Funston the reasons for Carranza's recognition and for the stand taken against the Villistas by the United States in placing an embargo on food, water and munitions for his men.

Villa complained bitterly of his lot, according to the officer, but Funston refused to discuss the question, telling Villa the United States forces were ready to act if Mexican bullets hit America or American property.

Colonel Luis Block, an officer of General E. P. Calles' staff in Agua Prieta, charges that an American electrician in Douglas sold to Villa for a large sum the plans and keys to the mines around the city, so that Villa can explode the mines if he returns to the attack.

General Funston has established a line of communication with the Carranzista headquarters in Agua Prieta with Major James A. Ryan, Adjutant of the Second brigade, acting as interpreter. The Mexican officers meet Ryan at the international line to receive and transmit messages.

This Morning's Battle.
Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 3.—Artillery in Agua Prieta suddenly opened a terrific fire on handfuls of Villistas attacking

around the city early today creating intense excitement here.

Douglas, believing the fighting over, at least for a while, had resumed its normal routine. The uproar below at the border sent the population crowding into the main streets.

Children on their way to school were turned back, Superintendent W. E. Lutz announcing all schools would be closed until the battle ended.

Great activity was displayed among the American troops here. Cutting through the direction of commanding sounded sharp ammunition tangle calls. It was apparent that the soldiers were ready to move on short notice.

The few Villistas around Agua Prieta made little or no attempt to return the fire. That their presence was exceedingly hard on the nerves of the garrison was indicated by the hysterical manner in which the cannon, rifles and machine guns burst out afresh every time a Villista showed his head.

Cannot Invade Mexico.

Washington, Nov. 3.—A request from General Funston in command of the American border troops for authority to invade Agua Prieta, if necessary, in consequence of the Villistas-Carranzista struggle there, was unfavorably received by high officials today. The war department said that such permission could be obtained only from President Wilson and there was no prospect of his giving it. Moreover, General Carranza's consent would have to be secured first, and there were no indications that the authorities contemplated asking him.

Villa's Army Now 23,000.
Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 3.—There was a lull in the fighting on the Mexican border here today.

General Francisco Villa has abandoned all positions before Agua Prieta and moved his forces to Cabullona, 12 miles south, where he found water, sufficient food to last a few days and fresh horses.

Villa's total strength is now 23,000, about 8,000 reinforcements having reached him today from Chihuahua. The withdrawal of this 8,000 from Chihuahua leaves the field open to the Carranzistas in that state.

After a conference on the border

with General Villa, General Frederick Funston, commanding the American troops, ordered four troops of the Tenth U. S. cavalry here from Naco, Arizona. They are encamped at Calumet and at the Arizona Smelter a mile west of Douglas.

Four additional troops of the Thirtieth U. S. cavalry, ordered here from Columbus, N. M., are due in a few hours.

In the conference on the border Villa told Funston he would again attack Agua Prieta, using his own judgment with regard to placing his cannon. "If any shells fall in Douglas," he said, "I shall be sorry."

General Calles' casualty list shows that he lost 35 dead, and 65 wounded in defeating Agua Prieta.

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—Hauled into court to face a charge of running his automobile with only one light, Fred Merkle, the famous New York Giant ball player, broke down on the witness stand and wept today when the prosecutor asked the arresting officer to withdraw the charge and shake hands with Merkle.

The officer, Albert Munn, an all around athlete, consented. Merkle left the court room still weeping.

When Merkle took the stand and gave his name and occupation, the prosecutor, addressing the court said: "I do not think it is right that these two great athletes should be at odds. I think the case should be dismissed and the men shake hands."

Merkle burst into tears and sobbed loudly.
