### MIKADO ON THE WAY TO HIS CORONATION

Takes Imperial Shrine, Sacred Treasures Divine Mirror and Other Things

Tokyo, Japan, Nov. 5.—Japan's Emperor today departed for Kyoto, taking with him the Imperial Shrine with its Sacred Treasures, the Divine Mirror, the Sword and the Jewel bequeathed to the Emperors by the Sun Goddess, in anticipation of his coronation at that place November 10.

The substance of all the coronation rites to be observed between today and December 1, is ancestor worship "justified by the grace of Heaven from time immemorial." Not more than twenty white persons will witness this bizarre, splendid, yet simple return to the primitive days of the world when man worshipped the spirit of his dead father in temples that were rude huts. Count Okuma characterized this ceremony as "the natural reverence of a son for his father, carried beyond the grave and expended into a great system of society in which the nation is a super-family and the Emperor a super-father."

### Did It Ever Happen to You? - - - By Mort Burger



Father! Every phase of the ceremony is some communication of the new Emperor to all the dead emperors concerning his accession to the throne.

The shrine, conveyed in a gorgeous and bedizened "bogey carriage," is itself just a plain, white, undecorated wooden shed such as the first emperors used.

On November 9, the emperor at Kyoto will receive Mr. George Guthrie, American ambassador at Tokyo, and former mayor of Pittsburgh and other foreign representatives. Mr. Guthrie may be unable to reach Kyoto in time for this reception as he has been in the United States recently.

There is no crown and no crowning at the coronation November 10. The ceremony is conducted in a pavilion of plain white wood, in the center of which the Emperor's canopy (not throne), is set. No nails are used in this structure, nor paint nor ornaments. The Emperor reads an address to the princes, officials and foreign representatives. It will be the first time foreigners have attended the ceremony.

Count Okuma will read an address to the Emperor, then 2,000 Japanese nobles will yell three "banzais" and the coronation will be concluded.

The days following will be observed various ceremonies, such as "the sacrifice of the fruits of the earth to the spirits of the departed." This begins at nightfall and concluded at the dawn.

The bringing back of the Imperial Shrine to Tokyo completes the coronation program.

**Vast Throng Estimated Above Half a Million Lined the Route**

Tokyo, Nov. 6.—Mikado Yoshihito left Tokyo this morning for Kyoto, the former capital, where he is to be crowned.

A multitude estimated at anywhere from half a million people lined the route traversed by the gorgeous imperial procession from the palace to the station. The journey was made in great state and the red coach was seen in public for the third time. Next to the emperor public attention was arrested chiefly by the palquin in which the sacred treasures, the sword, the mirror as the jewels which constitute the regalia of Japan were borne. These relics, as the dwelling place of the spirits of the imperial ancestors are credited with superhuman attributes, and as they are only removed from their shrine in the palace once in each reign, were viewed by thousands of devout Shintoists as they passed through the streets.

In order to avoid the long railway journey, His Majesty will spend the night at Nagoya, entering Kyoto in full state tomorrow forenoon. At Kyoto an archaic and extremely interesting

ceremony will be performed in connection with the reception of the imperial treasures. A special building of a sacred nature will be constructed to house them during their stay in Kyoto, and they will be installed there in the afternoon with Shinto rites.
