Spray To Prevent Damage to Prune Trees

The following article written by C. O. Constable, Marion county fruit inspector, is of special interest to fruit growers and particularly those owning prune orehards: Owing to the loss to the growers by

brown rot, cylindrosporium leaf spot and the synets albida insect during the past season I have taken the matter up for our mutual interest, with Prof. Barns and Prof. Posey, of the Oregon Agricultural college, with a view of learning the best method of control. Unless you have observed very carefully you do not realize the extent of damage that has been done by the

The cylindrosporium leaf spot by causing the leaves and fruit to fall in mid summer, the loss of fruit and an-marketable condition at drying time by brown rot, and the eaten folinge and one sided imperfect and unmarketable cherries and prunes by the syneta al-

bida bug. We have outlined for the orchards: that I am interested in as follows: Cylindrosporium Leaf Spot. Plow all leaves under as deep as the roots will permit soon as possible.
