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FRENCH COMMISSION IS NOW IN AMERICA

This Is Regarded By Mr. Masn As Most Important Action of Belligerents

New York, Nov. 15.—The most important action of the belligerents looking toward recovery from the destructiveness of war is the American tour of the French industrial commission.

A nation pays its debts with its products. France is preparing to use them to work out her salvation, just as after the Napoleonic wars she saved herself by new inventions and industrial expansion.

American workers are from four to five times more productive than the Europeans per man. France recognized this fact and hence the commission in learning American methods.

A present, the Germans occupy the industrial center of France. After the war France must rebuild her devastated factories. If she equips them with modern American machinery and follows American methods of efficiency, she can recover from the exhaustion of war and increase her wealth and prosperity.

The same course must be opened to the other nations or future generations will be burdened with staggering debts.
