SALEM SOCIAL CENTER CHANGES ITS METHODS

City Will Be Canvassed and Jobs Will Be Listed For Unemployed

The Salem Social Service Center, at their meeting last evening, decided to change the usual order of aiding those in need of work, by first soliciting the employers in the city, and learning definitely where work may be obtained this winter. With this information the Social Center hopes to find work for those men who have not been able to secure it themselves.

Working towards this end, a room will be secured where the unemployed may stay, in order that as soon as a call for a worker is received at the Commercial club, the men can be at once placed on the job.

Stampage land has been secured close to the city, and in urgent cases, men will be put to work chopping wood.

A list of men needing work will be kept by Ivan G. McDaniel, at the Commercial club, and those who have any odd jobs, may secure a man without delay by telephoning him.

The Center will soon designate a bundle day, when it is hoped that many citizens will prepare all the old clothes and shoes for children as well as men, and prepare them in a bundle, to be collected. In this collection work, the Social Center will need the assistance of several who have autos.

There are many children in the city who are compelled to stay out of school for the lack of clothing and shoes and it is for these, that the Social Center hopes for generous donations of several who have autos.

A typical case now under the care of the Center, is that of a family with nine children. The father has been out of work for three months, and one of the children is sick from exposure, caused by insufficient clothing.

Governor Appoints Delegates to Reclamation Congress

At the request of Mr. E. M. Rice, chairman of the executive committee of the Washington State Reclamation conference, Governor Withycombe has appointed three delegates to attend a convention of western states to be held in San Francisco on December 2 and 3, for the purpose of urging the passage by congress of the Jones bill, relating to the reclamation of arid, semiarid, swamp and overflow lands, and authorizing government aid therefor.

The delegates appointed by the governor are O. C. Laurgaard and A. L. Gage, of Portland, and C. N. Ravlin, of Hood River, now at the Oregon building, Panama-Pacific International exposition grounds, San Francisco.

Lost--1 San Marinese Legation! -- FINDER Please Notify Gerard

Berlin, Oct. 15. (By mail.)--A Washington cablegram today instructed Ambassador Gerard to take over the diplomatic affairs, documents and the property of the tiny Italian republic of San Marino, geographically the smallest republic in the world. The country covers only a few square miles, has but 20,000 inhabitants and possesses ruins which cannot be used in target practice because they overshoot the borders in all directions.

Nevertheless, San Marino has declared war on Germany and Mr. Gerard is its Berlin representative. The only trouble is that he can't find anything with which to do the representing. An representative in Berlin of England, Japan and other enemies of Germany's Mr. Gerard has taken over their enormous embassies and voluminous documents. He has tried and tried to find the San Marino legation. He can't find a thing. He said he might advise Washington that the legation is mislaid or that, if San Marino ever had a legation or anything else in Berlin, somebody has walked away with it.

DR. CARL G. DONEY ON CIVIC PRIDE

President of Willamette University Talks to Members of 6 o'Clock Club

Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette University, addresses the members of the Six o'Clock club at their meeting held last evening at the First Methodist church, taking for his subject "Civic Pride."

In a general discussion of the ethical side of the question, the speaker declared that civic pride should be based on things that are reasonable, and that our energies should be directed to the socialization of sentiment.

"One of our serious phenomena, is that of enlisting the sympathies, and then letting it go at that," said Mr. Doney, "but one of the hopeful signs of the times is that we are coming together in a social industry."

As to the relation of the employer and the employed, the speaker declared that the employers would find that it pays in manhood and practical results, to treat the laborer right.

"The church must project itself into the individual life of its constituents and should also direct its energies towards the people."

As to the "spok barrel" proposition in politics, Dr. Doney deplored the practice of each representative in congress to secure an appropriation for his district whether needed or not.

That the interest of the country was now world wide, he noted from the fact that in the present age it was essential that the millions in China should be healthful, in order that we might remain so, so closely were the two countries interwoven in commerce.

Salem's educational institutions, he felt, were much superior to the average city of this size. "Last spring when I first visited here, I felt that I was looking at the prettiest city in the country and I have asked travelers whether they ever saw a more beautiful city."

Dr. Doney regretted to see certain business activities in Salem on Sunday. "The keeping open of stores in the city seems strange to me," he said.

Justice Benson and Burnett, and Judge J. C. Moreland contributed to the program. Other speakers were Rev. Richard S. Tischer, Professor Hall of the University, D. N. McInturff and Dr. W. S. Mott.

The large attendance was complimentary to Dr. Doney, whose address was given the closest of attention to the 100 men present, and the excellent dinner served by the ladies of the Englewood circle was also duly appreciated.

Aurora's Latest Product Is a Dessicated Cat

Ancient Egypt has nothing on the little town of Aurora in the way of mummies. Of course the mummy from the town with the sunrise name and the blush of morning in its title, is not as old nor so highly spiced as some of the old Egyptian queens, but is of the same stock, being as Sin Lindsay, who purchased and brought it here, says "some cat."

The Thomas who was the original cat evidently turned up among the missing some 60 odd years ago, for his mummy was found under an old warehouse when the latter was torn down recently. The building was put up by the old Dutch colony that settled at Aurora in the early 50s, and as there was apparently no way in which the cat could get under the building after it was erected, it is supposed he was caught snapping when the floor was laid, and perished by starvation.

The body is as dry as a 1916 Portlan and the skin is white and smooth with whiskers still in place. The mummy is being exhibited in Salem today and appears to lack only hair and yowl to be a real live cat. Mr. Lindsey intends sending it to the Oregon historical society to give George Himes a chance to write the history of Oregon's sole known mummy, the long lost cat of Aurora.

Net Tightened About Accused German Officer

supplying German sea raiders; that \$750,000 was deposited for him for this work, that a considerable portion was sent to San Francisco which was made a base of widespread activities in this respect.

The defense stood ready to admit that the \$750,000 was spent and even to admit that \$2,000,000 was put out upon the German government orders, but in so doing the attorneys said they could not admit any effort to defraud or deceive the United States customs authorities.

The government, however, intends to produce its own witnesses to prove its case and hence rejected the defense offer.

All admissions concerning Boy-ed were withdrawn. Therefore today the government determined to establish its contention that he was the mainspring of the alleged fraud.

Talkenberg's Evidence

Weaving the net of evidence about operations of Naval Attache Boy-ed of the German Embassy and Hamburg-American line officials, the government today put on the stand Captain Fritz Talkenberg, alleged aid in the plot to supply German commerce raiders.

Falkenberg testified that the Hamburg-American officials chartered his steamer, Berwind.

She left New York, August 5, 1914 for an unknown destination, directed by the defendant Adolph Poppinghorne, ostensibly, the vessel cleared for Buenos Aires.

On the morning of 28, the Berwind sighted the German raiders Cape Trafalgar, Santa Lucia, Alice Woerner and Lorenza off Trinidad.

"We are transferring our supplies to them," said Falkenberg, "when the British converted cruiser Carmenia hove in sight. The German ships scattered. After a running fight of two hours, the Cape Trafalgar sank."

The Britisher did not attack the Berwind, for she flew the American flag, so Falkenberg headed toward Rio Janeiro and reached there unmolested.

There Poppinghorne disembarked, the captain said. Upon returning to New York, Falkenberg received \$509 additional compensation from Karl Buehr, head of the Hamburg-American line, he said.

Frederick Haesler, president of the Inter-American Steamer line testified that the Hamburg-American officials chartered his vessel Thor after the outbreak of the war, ostensibly to carry coal to Santiago.

Haesler chartered two other ships on the understanding that they were to be used in Cuban and South American trade. He became suspicious, he said, when the Thor put into Newport News instead of going to Brazil as consigned. His inquiries in the circumstances led to cancellation of one charter.

Later the Thor was destroyed and the Hamburg-American indemnified him for the loss.

Robert Haesler, brother of the preceding witness, testified that the defendant Hochmeister was at Newport News when the Thor put in there. Cross-examination revealed the fact that Haesler is British.

Afterward the defense admitted that

the supplies for the chartered vessels had been purchased and disposed of by Hochmeister.

Harry Rayner, of Newport News, testified that Hochmeister on August 2, 1914, ordered supplies delivered to Captain Suirun of the Marie Quezada, then at Newport News. The defense admitted that the supplies were purchased and turned over to Suirun but were intended for the steamer Urida.

They denied that the defendants had anything to do with the Quezada, but failed to get the evidence stricken out.

The government attorneys showed Rayner the letter of Suirun referring him to "room 801, 11 Broadway" for payment.

"Did you know that was Boy-ed's room?" asked the prosecutor.

A quick objection on the ground that the question was leading prevented Rayner from answering. Rayner testified, however, that checks for payment for supplies were drawn on the Hamburg-American line.

During the day, the defense filed a statement showing that \$1,118,579 had been spent in supplying German ships. This admission was made in order to stop the government from introducing a host of witnesses to prove the expenditures. The defense will contend, however, that their actions constituted no violation of United States laws or international treaties.

New York Has Case Parallaling Baby Bollinger

New York, Nov. 24.--New York today had a deformed baby case, paralleling in many respects that of Baby Bollinger of Chicago whom parents and doctors allowed to die rather than to permit an operation.

The New York baby was born last night to Mrs. Joseph Roberts. It has club feet, distorted knees and paralysis of the legs, while a spinal ailment is expected to prove fatal in the course of a few hours, according to Dr. Julius Foldsmit.

The parents and relatives of the child oppose an operation and want to allow nature to take its course as it did in the Bollinger case.

On the other hand, Dr. Goldsmith, unlike Dr. Haiselden of Chicago, is desirous of operating. He has urged the parents to agree to such a course in an attempt to save the child. In this case the prospects are for physical, rather than mental or moral deficiency should the child's life be saved.
