LOBSTERS FROM EAST.
Anacortes, Wash., Nov. 25.—Four thousand lobsters from the Atlantic coast were planted near here yesterday afternoon by Professor Kincaid of the University of Washington, and Henry O'Malley, of the fisheries bureau. There were 6,500 when they started west, but part of them died. A special tank will carry 300 of the best lobsters to Japan where they will be planted by the Japanese government.

Alleged Plot Unearthed By Tacoma Authorities
Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 26.—Federal authorities today are investigating the reported statements to a reporter for a Tacoma morning paper of Raleigh Falconer, held in the county jail here awaiting trial on a charge of smuggling, in which Falconer is alleged to have braided an alleged plot to destroy property of the allies on the Pacific coast.

Falconer, according to the printed story, declared that an organized gang of men, financed by representatives of the German government is responsible for the destruction of a Seattle pier with a loss of a million dollars, the blowing up of a powder barge and attempts to destroy steamships and other property. He claims, the story says, that he was asked to help in the burning of the Seattle docks and was offered \$500 for his share, but refused. Falconer is said to have given the names of three men who, he claims, were implicated in the Seattle "jobs." He is also reported to have said he would tell the name of the leader to the federal authorities if given immunity in the smuggling case against him. This leader, he said, received his instructions from those "higher up" in the east.

Falconer, in his alleged statement declares it to be his belief that the leader of the gang is still on the coast and added that within 30 days other big "jobs" either here or at Seattle, Vancouver, San Francisco or Los Angeles will be attempted.

NOT YET, BUT SOON
When the tall stack at the sawmill of the Falls City Lumber company emitted great gobs of black smoke the other day the denizens of that place wondered if the expected had really happened, but later learned that the boilers had been fired simply to oil the big belts. But there is every prospect that the mill will not be long idle. As one Falls City man remarked, "It's a good omen, anyway." —Wallas Observer.
