THE MARKETS
 Although the English government has taken over 20,000,000 bushels of wheat in Canada, and the markets in Portland and Chicago reported stronger, there has been no change in the local conditions. Wheat is worth from 80 to 82 cents in Salem, the prevailing price for several weeks.

With the exception of veal, which is weak and quoted at 8 cents, there is no change in the live stock market. Sugar is still quoted at 86.80 and 87 and instead of a decline of 30 cents as predicted a few days ago, the chances are now favorable for an advance of 10 cents a hundred. At least this is the opinion of several grocers who keep pretty close in touch with the sugar market.

Every coach and critic in the northwest picked Johnny Beckett as tackle on the mythical All-Northwest football eleven, thereby according that player the honor of being the only man unanimously agreed upon for any one position.

Zimmerman and Bangs, the two Washington State college players, were given 10 votes each for end and half-back, respectively, while Abraham of the Oregon Aggies, received seven votes for fullback and three for half-back.

Hap Miller, the University of Washington demon, did not strike the eyes of the selectors as in former years, getting seven for halfback and two for fullback.

Laythe of O. A. C., also got nine votes, five for guard and four for tackle.

Huntington, of Oregon, and Durbin, of W. S. C., tied for the position of quarterback, the Oregon contingent selecting Huntington on his great showing in the O. A. C. and Multnomah games.

State Engineer Issues Report of Ochoco Project

The Ochoco Project report, which is the second of a series of reports to be gotten out by the state engineer's office, and the U. S. Reclamation Service acting in co-operation, is now available for distribution. It is by John T. Whistler and John H. Lewis and contains 98 pages of printed matter with detailed plans and estimates of the cost of construction.

This report shows that 15,000 acres of arid land in the vicinity of Prineville, Crook county, can be irrigated at a cost of \$51.30 per acre. It is understood that the people of this section are seriously considering the advisability of forming an irrigation district for its construction.

A report on the Silver Lake project, embracing approximately 50,000 acres in Northern Lake county is now on the press and will soon be available for distribution.

The construction cost is approximately \$25.00 per acre. A brief summary of the conclusions in this report was recently forwarded by the state engineer to Mr. Strahor, who is interested in railroad transportation to this section. A strong movement for the construction of this project, through local effort appears to have developed.
