WANTS COMMISSION TO PASS ON BABIES

Doctor Thinks Protection of Race Demands Removal of the Unfit

San Francisco, Dec. 10.—Creation of state or even national commissions to see that sub-normal children are not born into the world—a sort of eugenic clearing house—was forecasted here today by Dr. S. Nicholas Jacobs, local physician. At the same time, he suggested that should monstrosities still result, the commission should be empowered to pass on any single physician's judgment as to what fate the child should meet. Such a body would guard against repetition of the case of Dr. Haislenden of Chicago, in which surgery was with-

held and Baby Bollinger was permitted to die—at least, it would prevent any one doctor from decreeing death. The big broad purpose, outlined to the United Press today would be the eugenic clearing house idea. Such a commission would seek to make the race better. "All one has to do to be convinced of the need of such a body," he said, "is to take a trip to the feeble minded home at Glen Ellen, in Sonoma county. There is located a home for sub-normal children. Some have positively no brains. They are what is known as zeros. A dog knows more than they do, for a dog has some intelligence. There are no more than lumps of clay." With such children, he declared, death must appear to most persons preferable to life. But where possible to prevent such situations, he believes the state or nation ought to undertake it. "I can't say that I believe a single doctor should pass on whether a sub-normal child should live," he commented. "Such a condition would mean that where criminal means are now used to prevent a child from coming into the world, it would be born and then some unscrupulous doctor would decide that it ought to die. That would lead to a serious situation. But a com-

mission to deal with such cases, and to propound sound eugenic doctrines and rules would prove, in the end, a boon to humanity. It would mean that the misfits would be eliminated. "I firmly believe that the time to act is now and I believe that we will see such a commission established sooner or later."

Secretary Garrison Takes Dig At Bryan

Washington, Dec. 10.—Administration officials here professed to see today in Secretary of War Garrison's annual report, a "dig" at former Secretary of State Bryan and his anti-preparedness followers. Garrison suggested that those who oppose preparedness on the basis of Divine injunction against it "surrender life and all they cherish and love at the behest of the aggressor." Inasmuch as wars have occurred since time began, Garrison feels there is no basis for a belief that America will escape. To those who counsel that militarism will be the outgrowth of increased preparedness, the secretary warned that "reasonable preparedness is the best antidote for such a condition." As for arbitration advocates—and Bryan, it was pointed out, is the leader in this advice—Garrison commented, that they feel "if we are weak in action, we will be strong and persuasive in counsel." He hinted that some sort of compulsory service may result if the nation

does not answer the administration call for a voluntary continental army.
