High Price Paid For Premium Steer

Thirty-five cents a pound or \$537.25 for the animal was the price paid for the Livestock Show yesterday for the 1535-pound prize steer, Benefactor No. 2, when the auctioneer, N. G. Krassley, announced that the steer had been sold to W. J. Hill, the son of the empire builder and owner of a stock ranch in North Dakota. Most of the bidding for the animal lay between C. C. Colt and Mr. Hill and, when the last call was issued for a higher bid and none came, Mr. Hill was announced winner.

The sale attracted a large crowd to the barn where the auction was held and despite the heavy rain the place was filled. Many women were present. Benefactor the Second was owned by the University of Idaho and will be used by Mr. Hill as a show animal. It is declared to be the finest animal of his breed that has ever been exhibited in the Northwest.—Portland Journal.

WILL TEST RIGHT TO SET ASIDE FRANCHISE

Woodburn, Ore., Dec. 10.—The city council has instructed City Attorney Blaine McCord to bring action to restrain the Western Telephone company from raising telephone rates over those specified in the franchise granted the company by the city on October 4, 1910. The monthly maximum rates in the franchise agreement are \$1.50 for a single party line and \$1 for more than two. The public service commission recently granted the company permission to raise the rates over the franchise maximum rates. The principle involved in the authority of the commission to trespass on municipal franchise premises in this city over the raise in rates of the Western company, which recently took over the Favorite Telephone company's system here and now has a monopoly. The council is championing the patrons and asking that the franchise agreement be carried out to the letter. There is a movement on foot toward the annulment of the franchise by a vote of the people if the suit goes against the city.

Potts was sleeping on the porch of his home here when a woman on horseback rode close to his cot, squirted the acid on his face with a liquid pistol, and galloped away laughing.

Screaming in agony, Potts rolled to the floor where he was found writhing. His eyesight was destroyed, his face burned terribly, and his chest and arms seared. Unconsciousness soon relieved his sufferings.

His relatives suspect a young woman who is believed to have been jealous of him.
