### New Citizens at Dallas; County Jail Is Empty

(Capital Journal Special Service.)  
Dallas, Oregon, Dec. 11.—Application for citizenship papers have been filed with County Clerk Asa B. Robinson by Ernest Albert Smiley, a native of Nova Scotia who arrived in this country May 4, 1902, and by Edward M. Cochrane, of Ontario, Canada, who came to the United States October 2, 1884.

### Big K. of P. Meeting.

Marmion Lodge No. 96 of this city held their annual roll call at the regular meeting of the lodge last Monday evening at which about 80 members and visiting brothers were present. In a contest between two degree teams which put on the third rank the team headed by Dr. R. F. Butler defeated the aggregation headed by E. M. Bethel. Glen O. Holman, a member of the Portland lodge, W. P. Lewis of the Falls city lodge and Mr. Layton of the Aberdeen, Washington lodge, acted as judges and were loud in their praises of the work of the winning team. It is doubtful if there is another lodge in the state outside of Portland that could get together two full teams from their membership and the fact that Marmion lodge can put on the work with two teams is something to be proud of. After the close of the lodge light refreshments were served.

### County Jail Now Empty.

The Polk county jail is now empty for the first time since July. The six Buena Vista boys having been pardoned by the governor Monday and Robert Chase, a gambler from Independence having completed his 75 day sentence.

### City Will Not Sell Machinery.

At a meeting of the city fathers Monday evening it was decided not to dispose of the machinery at the rock crushing plant to the Portland Cement company. The company through their engineer S. B. Taylor of this city proposed to purchase the machinery and then sell the crushed rock for use on the Dallas streets to the city at \$1.05 a cubic yard delivered at Dallas. Although the members of the council considered the proposition a fair one they thought it unwise to act on it without further investigation.

### Budget Shows No Increase.

After several days of hard work on the part of the county court the budget for the coming year has about been completed. Although provision is made for the construction of the new Marlon-Polk bridge at West Salem and a large amount of road work, no material increase in the amount of the budget is noticed. In the court will meet again December 30 when it will hear all objections that may be filed. \$35,000 is set aside for the building of roads and highways.

### THE WOODBURN VIEW

A large number adversely criticize Governor Withycombe for his lack of perspicacity and display of poor judgment in making some of his appointments to office, but he should instead be the object of much sympathy. The governor has not been a shrewd, professional politician and has trusted too much to biased advice and outward appearance. He has evidently seen the errors made in some of the appointments, but is probably too polite and considerate to remedy such mistakes by asking for certain resignations. Then, he is of that makeup that he hates to acknowledge errors by taking such a course. Here is where the man's politeness comes in. He awaits the initiative on the part of the appointees and longingly looks for their resignations. These appointees, Cady and White in particular, are too dense to understand that their official procedure is embarrassing Governor Withycombe and making his administration decidedly unpopular. This is written merely to help the governor, draw these incumbents' attention to the true situation, and point out to them their duty to the administration and the public at large. If they are Governor Withycombe's friends they will not only tender their resignations, but insist upon acceptance. Cady is said to have made a fizzle of the flax experiment; White will find it difficult to get much of an appropriation for the National Guard, which according to well authenticated reports is not in the best of shape and growing worse under his supervision.

**DEATH OF PIONEER.**  
Mary Ann Allen, aged 84, an early Oregon pioneer and mother of the late Wiley B. Allen, died at her home, 592 East Alder street, late last night. Mrs. Allen was born in Illinois, November 7, 1831, and crossed the plains to Oregon with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Settlemier, in 1850. In 1853 she married Thomas A. Allen. Most of her life was spent in Portland. Wiley B. Allen, her son, founder of the music house which still bears his name, died in San Francisco in 1905, and Thomas B. Allen, the husband, died the same year. Mrs. Allen is survived by a daughter, Miss Lilly B. Allen of this city.—Portland Telegram, December 24.

**BROOKS PLANT WIZARD.**  
Father George Schoener of Brooks will hereafter make his home in Portland and be known as the plant wizard of Oregon. He will be at the head of the "Schoener Scientific Gardens," located on the Peninsula near St. Johns.

No plants will be raised for sale, the purpose being to improve existing varieties of flowers and fruits and create new varieties especially adaptable for profitable production in Oregon.

Work begins at once with the receiving of 10,000 plants, including 6000 roses from all parts of the world, taken from Father Schoener's first garden at Brooks, Oregon.—Woodburn Independent.
