





# SCHMIDT AND CAPLAN ORIGINAL PLANS FOR ERECTION OF BRIDGE

# Contractors Would Eliminate **Competition For Proposed**

Structure

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 18.—Although David Caplan is not on trial at present charged with murder in connection with the dynamiting of the Times building. That those who are working for a bridge across the river at this city are finding a few stumbling blocks in their way is shown by the newspaper, reports that an effort is being made to coange the plans even at this late date. The viewers called for competative plans to fill certain specifications and the plans were to be sent in on or before December 24 and they are adhering to this plan in spite of reports to the contrary which they brand as false.

When it became settled that a new bridge was imperative the highway engineers of the state estimated that the cost of a new reinforced concrete structure would cost from \$100,000 to \$235,000 but that it was possible to build a bridge cheaper than this, however, it was a question of whether or not a cheaper type would be more economical in the long run.

In order to placate the construction companies it was decided to call for competative plans from engineers and to pay the sum of \$1,000 for the set of plans that was finally selected. This was agreeable to the bridge companies but at the recent meeting held in Polk county it was suggested by the bridge men that all competative plans be eliminated and that a certain engineer be hired to draw plans according to the specifications of the higaway engineers.
