### Indicted Men Appear and Give Bail Bonds

Washington, Dec. 31.—Ex-Congressman Fowler, Henry R. Martin and Hermann Schultheis appeared before United States Commissioner Taylor today and gave \$5,000 bonds for their appearance in New York in connection with indictments charging them with being actually plotters in Labor's National Peace council.

Representative Buchanan, of Illinois, also under indictment, agreed with the department of justice that he will go to New York Tuesday to plead and will bail there.

It is understood that Fowler, Martin and Schultheis will fight extradition. Their hearings is scheduled for January 30.

### MINISTER RECEIVES NOTE

Washington, Dec. 30.—The Austrian reply to the American Ansona demands has been received by American Ambassador Penfield of Vienna.

Penfield reported that the note is about 3,000 words long. It is anticipated that editing and sending will require some time. Possibly it will be here tomorrow afternoon, however.

East Oregonians: Far more wheat is being shipped east than people realize, says H. C. Oliver, traveling freight agent for the O. W. B. & N., who is in the city today. The shortage of shipping and the closing of the Panama canal has forced the business by rail and heavy shipments have been made from some sections. Considerable wheat has been shipped from Portland to the middle and eastern states. It requires an average of 90 days to ship a car to Chicago and back. Hence there is danger of a car shortage if the movement continues. The Southern Pacific is already facing a car shortage.

Ashland Tidings: Owing to the rail-road collision here earlier in the year, Ashland stood third this year in fatalities as to the number of accidents reported to the state commission. Portland led and the manufacturing center of Oregon City was second. By way of Oregon's comparison with California, industrial workers in the golden state the past year lost 900 fingers, 172 eyes are missing, 25 arms and 18 legs were amputated, and 53 workmen were disabled to the extent of being given life pensions. The amount paid for the year as compensation was over \$600,000.

A report from Roseburg that the turkey supply is short is another argument for early Christmas shopping.

Just now Alaska is prominent in the minds of many Americans an interest that is stimulated by the construction in that country of a fifty million dollar railroad by the U. S. government. A short time ago a number of leading newspaper and magazine editors planned a trip to Alaska so that they might be able to judge for themselves the magnificent possibilities of this great land. Mr. William W. Sawyer, a socialist-lawyer of B. W. Hazard, of this city, and an old and intimate friend of Rev.
