Sixteen saloons went out of business in Marion county with the coming of the new year. The management of the Marion County Poultry show urge those who intend to enter exhibits to secure their blanks before next Friday, the day entries close. There is always a great rush the last day or two for entries, and as the show this year promises to eclipse that of any former year, it would assist materially if the entries were made early in the week.

More than \$12,000 has been distributed among the farmers during the last 40 days in the purchase of hogs by the firm of Eyre and Cavanaugh, who have been buying in the vicinity of the city and shipping to Portland. In all 1100 hogs have been shipped, which has cleaned up the country close in to the city, until now the firm is obliged to go out further in order to buy for their eye lot shipments. The price today is 5 1-2c on foot.

Dwight Misner, agent for the Dodge and Overland cars, is feeling the return of prosperity, as within the last three weeks he has sold six Dodge cars, three Overlands and two second hand cars. The news stands will have to be careful about selling papers or periodicals with advertisements of liquor houses. Part of the prohibition law, section 8, makes it a misdemeanor for any news stand to permit any periodical, paper or magazine to remain on its premises or to circulate any paper, circular, price list or order blanks advertising liquors. The law is very plain on this point and it behooves the local news stands to take a look through the advertising pages of papers or periodicals on hand. This new law may result in expanded prohibition editions being sent to Oregon and Washington.
