Soap, Towel and Water Companies Incorporate

A soap company, a towel supply company and a water company each filed articles of incorporation at the office of Corporation Commissioner Schulerman today. The L. M. B. Soap company of Portland, was incorporated with a capitalization of \$2,500, the Broadway Towel Supply company was incorporated at \$5,000, and The Illinois-Oregon Development company, an irrigation and power concern, was capitalized at \$25,000. All have their principal offices in Portland.

The fourth company to incorporate was the J. R. Wartman company, which is capitalized at \$2,000 and purposes to do a general contracting and construction business.

Police Capture Two In Rooming House

Last night the Salem police arrested B. F. Hendricks and Miss M. V. McFerrer in a room in a down town rooming house and locked them up in jail on a charge of disorderly conduct. Both appeared before Judge Elgin this morning in police court and were fined \$75 each or 12 and one-half days in jail. Hendricks, who conducts a photograph gallery on North Commercial street paid the fines of both parties and they were released from jail this forenoon.

INDICTMENTS DISMISSED.

Denver, Colo., Jan. 8.—Indictments against John P. White, John R. Lawson and other officials of the United Mine Workers were dismissed today by United States District Attorney Telfow. They were returned in Pueblo in December, 1913, early in the big Colorado coal strike. Telfow held they did not fall within the scope of the Sherman anti-trust law.
