THE MARKETS

The hay and feed market continues strong with a general upward tendency. Clover hay is now quoted at from \$10 to \$11 a ton and chest at \$10 for the lowest.

Pork on foot is also strong, with the local price at 6 cents for the best. Cabbage is now re-adjusting itself and the price fell off today bringing the quotations to one and three-quarters and two cents.

Cranberries are now out of the market. In Portland Saturday hogs went fast

and a 10 per cent gain was recorded, before the market closed. The bulk of the sales were at \$6.55 to \$6.85. The cattle division was slow and no sheep sales were recorded. One hundred and twenty-two cattle were received at the yards yesterday.

The great fault of the farmers in this part of the state who raise potatoes, is that they do not properly grade them, said a prominent potato buyer today. When a buyer is informed that a certain lot of potatoes is for sale he cannot depend on the farmer as to grade and must make a personal inspection before they are accepted. Many of the farmers are grading their potatoes, and grading them right, said this buyer, and these farmers are given the preference in purchases. This same firm recently bought a shipment of potatoes outside the state and on account of the proper grading, was able to get 10 cents a hundred more for them. In order to establish a market here, he was of the opinion that the farmers should work with the buyers and grade their potatoes properly.
