East Wyo Wheat
Movement of wheat to the east continues heavy from interior Pacific northwest points.

High prices are still being obtained for cargoes of Pacific northwest wheat in Europe.

Broomhall also reports the sale of the cargo of the British steamer Glenek with 30,000 quarters of fortyfold and club wheat.

Price of oats has been advanced so high in the interior by speculative interests that eastern business is not at the moment possible.

Son of Wealthy Man Arrested For Forgery
Portland, Ore., Jan. 14.—Charles W. Morrison, son of a wealthy stockman of Corona, N. M., is in the city jail here today and his bride of two weeks is making desperate efforts to get him out.

Morrison is accused of forging checks and drafts to the extent of \$11,500. The money he used to defray the expenses of his honeymoon.

Two weeks ago Morrison was married to Miss Adele B. Robinson in Los Angeles. He had quarreled with his father who refused him money.

Arrested late yesterday by detectives, Morrison admitted practically all the charges against him. His father has opposed his marriage, he said, and this was one reason for their estrangement.
