WOULD MAKE CHURCH SOCIAL CENTER

In yesterday's issue of the Capital Journal was a communication from Rev. Richard F. Tischer, which is well worthy of perusal and study. It shows in a remarkable degree the changes which have taken place in the churches within the past twenty years, and indicates the wonderful broadening of the religious mind.

Mr. Tischer says that if he could have his way as a minister he would provide his church with a social hall, a pool and billiard table for both boys and girls and with a gymnasium for all indoor sports. He goes even farther in saying he would arrange under proper supervision, dancing parties where the young could mingle and indulge their natural tastes for social pleasures.

He pertinently asks why or wherein dancing is any more immoral than coasting or skating, and thinks the church and the schools should provide the proper avenues, places and times for such edcuation and enjoyment.

All this sounds natural and rational, and is a much better solution of the problem as to what we shall do with our boys and girls than the arbitrary condemning of all such amusements simply because they are not properly safeguarded.

Nature has placed in the young of all kinds whether "kids" or kittens the desire to play, to exercise and develop. It is instinctive for the young of all animals to get together and to find in each others company, pleasure not understand English, and amusement.
