St. Louis, is in the city jail charged with shooting him. The police are looking for Mrs. Rose Dranges over whom the shooting is said to have occurred. Goldstein and

Dranges both declare they have not seen her for three years. Dranges, on a furlough, entered Goldstein's shop yesterday. He wanted to know where his wife was. After a brief altercation, Dranges shot Goldstein twice. While his victim lay groaning on the floor, Dranges calmly called the police, told them of the occurrence and sat on the tailor's table smoking a cigarette until the police arrived. He said Goldstein attacked him with a pair of shears.

Judge Percy R. Kelly To Be Candidate For Re-Election to Office

Judge Percy R. Kelly, of Albany, who handles the affairs in department No. 1 of the circuit court for Marion and Linn counties will file his declaration of candidacy for the republican nomination for the office of circuit judge this week. Judge Kelly was elected circuit judge in 1910 and began his duties January 1, 1911. During his incumbency on the bench he has won the respect and confidence of the bar associations both of Marion and Linn counties and this association in Linn county has assured his honor that no candidate will oppose his nomination in that county. To date no prospective candidate has announced his intentions in this county although several are said to covet Judge Galloway's seat.

Four Accidents Reported From Marion County

Four accidents were reported from Marion county to the industrial accident commission for the week ending February 3. At Silverton, J. C. Poppino broke a toe in a sawmill; S. Yamamoto sprained his ankle at Mill City in a sawmill; Bert Smith, of Salem, cut his foot working for the railroad, and John Brewer, of Salem, sustained a strained and bruised body in a flour mill. During the past week, January 28 to February 3, inclusive, there were reported to the state industrial accident commission 150 accidents of which one was fatal.

Of the total number reported 88 were subject to the workmen's compensation act; 48 were public utility corporations; 13 were from other firms and corporations who have rejected the provisions of the act; one was from firms and corporations who do not employ labor in hazardous occupation. The following shows the number of accidents by industry: R. R. operation 48, sawmill 41, construction 10, paper mill 6, iron and steel works 8, logging 4, flour mill 3, sand and gravel bunkers 3, transportation 3, light and power 3, meat packing 2. The following one each: Widow cleaning, sheet metal works, mining, gypsum manufacturing, wood manufacturing, teaming, stumps, farming, transfer company, plumbing, dredging, irrigation, fuel company, shipbuilding, machinery company, grocery, tinsmith, furniture manufacturing, department store.

Oregon Naval Militia Will Use U. S. S. Marblehead

Governor Withycombe today executed a formal agreement with Secretary of the Navy Joseph Daniels, for the purpose of securing the loan of the U. S. S. Marblehead, for the Oregon Naval Militia to replace the U. S. S. Boston, which has recently been withdrawn from service at Portland. The Marblehead will be withdrawn from service at San Francisco some time during this month and the Oregon will be stationed at San Francisco. The Marblehead will be in command of a naval officer with a suitable naval crew, and the navy department will be responsible for the care and preservation of the vessel the greater part of the time.

WILL RAISE WAGES

Wallace, Idaho, Feb. 4.—With a view of voluntarily increasing the wages of miners in the Coeur d'Alene district several mine managers met in conference here today and discussed the proposed sliding scale which will mean an increase in the pay roll of approximately \$50,000 a month. Three thousand miners will be affected by the raise.
