A jolly valentine party was given the young people of the Star Sunday school class of the Jason Lee church at the home of Mrs. C. M. Roberts, Saturday evening.

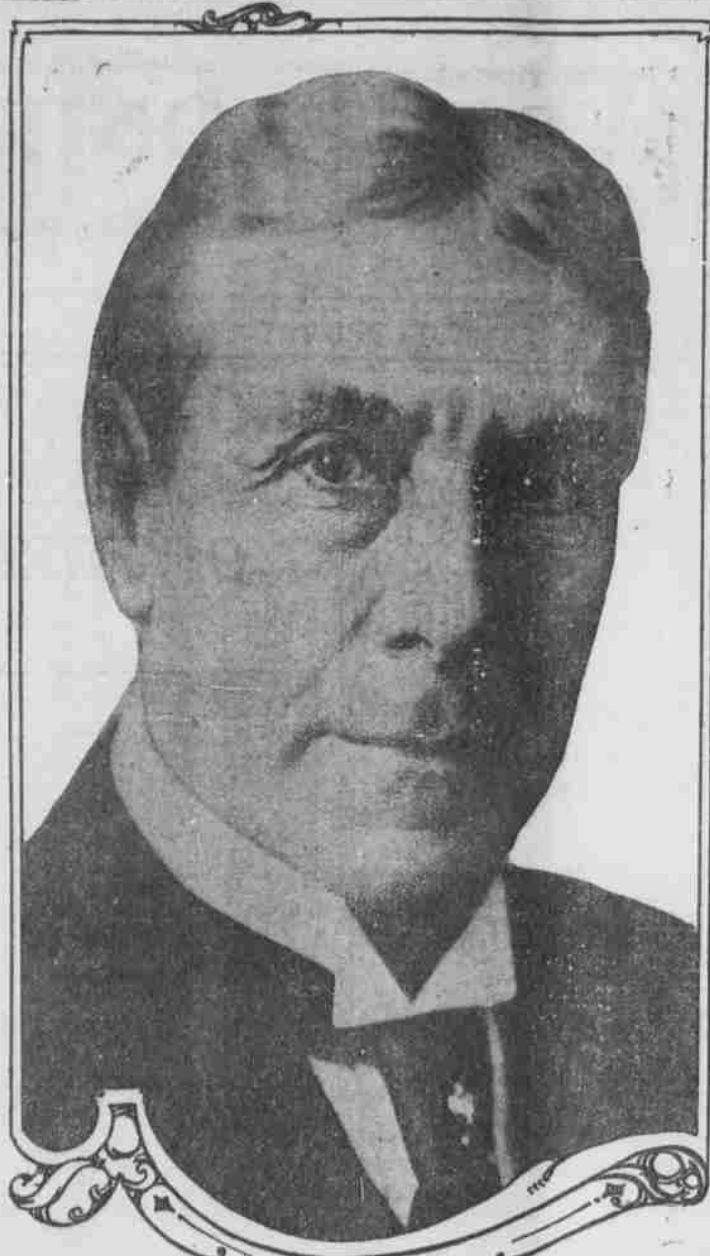

COUNCIL DISCUSSES MURDER AND POLICE AT REGULAR SESSION

Election of E. W. Stubbs As Deputy Health Officer is Ratified

Last night's meeting of the city council was calmed by discussions of the Hinkle murder and the question of a sanitary inspector. Aldermen A. B. Hudson, Frank Ward and Glen Unruh were named on a committee to confer with Governor Withycombe concerning the offering of a reward for the capture of the murderer. The council also ratified the action of the mayor and chief of police in employing special officers to work on this case and assist the police. As all of the police not at the call of the department are serving on regular shifts with special beats it was necessary to hire a special in order to allow one officer besides the chief to work on the Hinkle case exclusively.

Alderman Mills asserted that the crime showed the need of a policeman on duty at the depot at all times owing to the large floating element of rough characters that infest this section of the city.

The question of the election of E. W. Stubbs as deputy health officer aroused a lively discussion. Mr. Stubbs has been on the police force for the past year and when the council appropriated \$800 for a sanitary inspector made application for this position. The council finally ratified the election of Mr. Stubbs as deputy health officer but placed him under the health officer and chief of police jointly and he will report in duplicate and will serve in both departments doing double duty as a policeman and as sanitary inspector and health officer.

It was voted to place two lights on the Turner road, one at 21st street and one at Turner street. The matter of the street cars on Summer street was discussed and Alderman Roberts declared that the cars did not start running in the morning until 6 o'clock and that many workmen who began work at this hour were unable to use the Summer street line. He thought the cars should start at 6 o'clock. A committee was appointed to investigate the franchise of the company to find out if the company is obliged to start its cars at any certain time.

A committee consisting of the mayor, city engineer, and city attorney will investigate the Sanitation ditch and find out if the franchise and a clause in it that permits high waters to overflow the southeastern part of the city with impunity. The street committee was instructed to sell the old fire apparatus now stored in the 13th street fire station to make room for the storage of drain tile. The old hand pump is but a heap of junk and it was suggested that it be kept as a relic and the steam engine and hose cart sold. An ordinance was introduced to provide a license fee of \$10 each for the merchants patrol which is a private institution and not under the police department, and the matter was referred to the ordinance committee. The petition for improving Washington street was referred to the street committee.

The report of the books of City Recorder Elgin and City Treasurer Rice made by W. I. Staley, who audited the accounts were received and received favorable comment. The report of City Recorder Elgin shows the total outstanding on municipal bonds to be \$621,000, on charter act bonds to be \$50,477.88, and on Bancroft Act bonds to be \$456,367.03. Total outstanding warrants against the office in the general fund for the years 1900 to 1915, inclusive, are \$5,994.17, in the street fund for 1908 and 1915 are \$894.76. Outstanding street improvement warrants are \$52,478.57, and sewer warrants outstanding are \$5. Total of bonded improvement liens not paid or bonded are \$56,562.38. The report shows that for 1915 overpayments totalled only \$12.50. Receipts of the office for the year were \$4,446.64. Of this amount fines and forfeitures of bail constituted \$2,973.50.

Too Early to Judge Ford Expedition

promptly speech. Before he had spoken a dozen words, an American of Swedish nativity cut him off with a sharp "we don't want to hear from you!" spoken in Swedish, of course. It was not known until some time afterward what he had said. At least the speaker stopped speaking and the audience looked shocked. It later developed that the noted Swede was a winner of the Nobel prize in chemistry and of international prominence. A formal public apology published in the Stockholm papers followed. Similar incidents happened throughout the trip.

From authoritative sources, Mr. Toozee was informed that the expedition cost Mr. Ford at least a half million. Seventy-two thousand dollars alone were expended for passage on the Oscar. A similar amount was necessary to bring the party back. A bonus of \$50,000, in addition to the regular fares was required to secure a special train across Germany. At least \$30,000 was given in the form of gifts and donations. The officers, stewards, sailors, stokers and other employees on the Oscar received an aggregate of \$4,000 in gratuities. The stewards in dining salons were given \$50 apiece and even the stokers got \$10 each. The captain of the boat was given a Ford automobile and a Victoria. It is estimated that the permanent commission will cost Mr. Ford \$50,000 yearly. All legitimate expenses of the members of the expedition including laundry and necessary taxicab bills, were defrayed by Mr. Ford. The business organization, although poor at first, developed splendid efficiency. Gaston Plantiff, manager of Ford's eastern branch, was business manager of the expedition. With Mr. Plantiff as the incentive, the newspapermen adapted the following words to the tune of "John Brown":
