New York, Feb. 11.—Our foreign relations continue to be an important factor in the stock market. Apparently the Lusitania incident is settled. Highly important concessions have been made to American demands, and it is a source of satisfaction and relief to have so serious an uncertainty permanently removed.

In the war situation there is no change. The weary struggle drags its cruel way without developing any decisive features. When, however, we survey the situation at home, the outlook is one of genuine hopefulness and in strange contrast with the sad conditions abroad.

A further proof of business improvement if needed, will be found in the railroad situation. Earnings continue to show very satisfactory gains, particularly on the larger trunk lines.
