Rice. The findings in the case that

Liquor Confiscated
and Poured in Gutter

(Capital Journal Special Service.)
Dallas, Or., Feb. 18.—Seven or eight
dozen bottles of whiskey, which were
confiscated last Saturday night when
the sheriff of Polk county raided the
Sunrise Hotel, were poured into the gutter
at the intersection of Court and
Main streets Wednesday afternoon. The
performance attracted quite an inter-
ested crowd of onlookers, some of who
assisted the sheriff in the performance
his duty. Between 12 and 15 dozen bot-
tles of liquor were secured in the raid
last Saturday evening but the room in
the basement of the court house where
the goods had been stored was broken
into some time Tuesday night and about
five dozen bottles of the whiskey stolen.
Entrance was gained into the court
house by prying off the iron gratings of
one of the basement windows.

Suit Filed to Quiet Title.

Attorney Virgil H. Massey, of An-
th, filed a suit in the Polk county cir-
cuit court, Monday, which it contested
will be of unusual interest from a legal
standpoint. Massey is attorney for
R. J. Marvin, administrator of the es-
tate of Frank H. Hillman, who killed his
wife and then committed suicide at
their farm home near Bethel, last
Thanksgiving day. The defendants in
the action are Mildred and New Linke,
minor children of Mrs. Hillman and
their guardian, H. C. Patty. The suit
brought is to quiet title to the real es-
tate left by the deceased which con-
sists of about 49 acres of land near
Bethel, Polk county. Besides the real
estate the estate consists of personal
property to the amount of about \$1200.

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WATER COMPANY STANDS ON RIGHTS

Franchise Permits Cutting of
Pavements and It Insists
On This Right

According to the provisions of the
proposed ordinance in regard to the
cutting of paved streets for the pur-
pose of laying gas, water mains or oth-
er conduits, which will come before the
city council Monday night, the corpora-
tions and companies owning franchises
were notified by the city recorder of
the intention of the city council to pass
and adopt the ordinance at the regular
meeting, February 21.

The proposed ordinance provides that
it shall be unlawful for any person,
firm or corporation conducting busi-
ness wherein the streets or alleys are
used for purposes of laying mains or
conduits, to cut, break up, deface or
molest any pavement.

The Salem Water, Light & Power
company in response to the notice sent
it, filed a protest refusing to accept the
amendment to their franchise as
provided in the proposed ordinance.

The city cannot alter or amend their
franchise without their consent, and
relying on this clause in their fran-
chise, the Salem Water, Light & Power
company is standing on their legal
rights.

Owing to the progress of the city, it
was thought advisable to amend the
franchise, but as long as corporations
holding them rely strictly on their legal
rights, they can tear up the pavement
at will.

Many cities which are not so liberal
with their franchisees, do not permit the
tearing up of its streets, but compel
companies to lay mains and conduits
before street paving is laid down.
Practically all old franchises tie up the
city, legally.

The present franchise was granted to
the Salem Water company April 15,
1891, and signed by the mayor the fol-
lowing day.

The Salem Water company is basing
its protest on the following clause
which is found in all their franchises:
"This ordinance shall not be altered,
amended or repealed without the con-
sent of the said Salem Water company,
except by the violation by them of any
of the provisions of this ordinance."

WASHOUT ON DITCH

Saturday evening about 7 o'clock, the

water in the Stayton ditch broke
through the bank at the sawmill, and
soon the water supply for turning the
many wheels along the ditch was a
minus quantity. Both picture shows
were put out of commission and homes
and stores had to return to the smoky
old lamp or candles.

Repair work was begun the following
day, a temporary dam being built in
front of Brown's Machine shop. Wa-

ter was turned in Monday, and some
of the wheels were run that day and
electric light service resumed.

During the absence of water C. E.
Taylor, of the light plant, took advan-
tage of the empty ditch and put in four
cement piers for a bridge he expects to
build soon in front of the plant.—Sta-
yton Standard.
