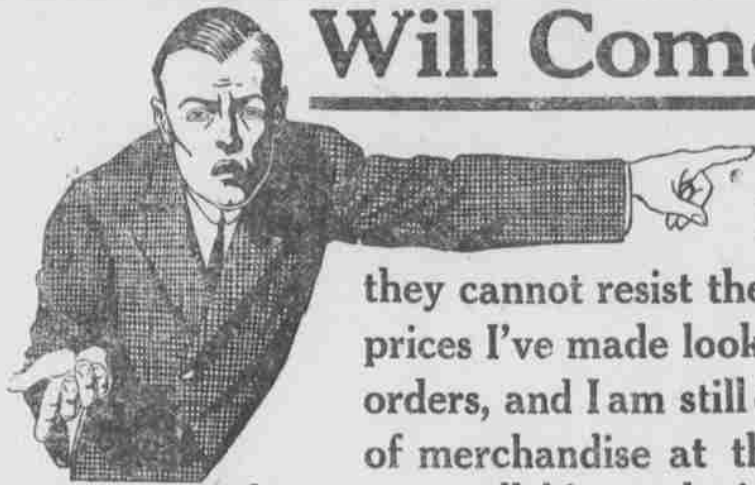

Dallas, Ore., March 2.—At a meeting of the Polk County Poultry association held at the court house Saturday afternoon plans were laid for an exhibit of the poultry of the members to be held in this city some time next December. The meeting adjourned until March 23 when ways and means will be discussed for the providing of funds for the carrying out of plans for the coming season.

Pyle was formerly a traveling salesman for a packing house and is well known throughout the Willamette valley.
