## Governor Withycombe Grants Paroles To List of 10 Convicts

Paroles were granted to the following inmates of the penitentiary by Governor Withycombe yesterday, upon the recommendation of the parole board:

T. F. Nugent, received from Lane county in October, 1913, for larceny in a dwelling.

Frank Sisco, received from Umatilla county in February, 1915, for larceny from the person.

William Moriarty, received from Columbia county in February, 1913, for larceny of horses.

Stella Williams, received from Umatilla county in March, 1915, for larceny in a dwelling house.

Calvin R. Worrall, received from Tillamook county in March, 1915, for attempt child stealing.

Eben J. Whitman, received from Lane county in March, 1914, for attempt assault.

Carl E. D. Evans, received from Multnomah county in January, 1915, for attempt burglary.

Dave Witmer, received from Umatilla county in March, 1915, for attempt to commit larceny.

Monard Fix, received from Grant county in November, 1914, for larceny of cows and steers.

George Wyan, received from Harney county in October, 1914, for assault with intent to kill.

## Polk County People Want Much Road Work

At the March meeting of the Polk county court, adjourned on Friday, several districts in widely separated parts of the county asked the court to pursue road development and construction work or to assist the districts in paying for the work that is needed to make the roads fit for travel. The residents of the Misthote district, south of Dallas, presented a petition signed by practically all the property owners there, in addition to a large number of Dallas business men, asking the court to appropriate an amount equal to that guaranteed by the petition for the purpose of grading and graveling the Samuel's hill. This hill has long been an obstruction to traffic, and the progressive farmers of the community wish to have it done away with. Their petition represented a large amount of money and labor that will be donated for the work at hand if the court will contribute a like amount. The commissioners are to investigate conditions at once, and it is probable that they will report favorably upon the plan.

Farmers from the Grand Ronde neighborhood presented a petition asking for the appropriation of an amount of money equal to the \$100 to be expended in the improvement of highways now practically impassable. The court will investigate. West Salem was represented by a petition pledging more than \$100 for roadwork, subject to a like appropriation from the court. The road work in this district is sorely needed by the residents and if possible their request for aid will be granted. A large delegation from the Oakdale district waited upon the court with a request that it authorize improvement on the roads of that section. The Oakdale district is hampered in many ways at present. The postoffice department will not put the residents there on a rural mail route because of the condition of the roads, and it is with this, among other things, in mind that the district is anxious to have the county do its road work. During the wet winter months it is extremely difficult to travel to and from the Oakdale community, and this presents a hardship to the people there which they can ill afford to bear.—Dallas Observer.

On Friday evening the club will meet to perfect the organization and to consider by-laws and constitution as well as to discuss plans for the work of the club during the first year of its existence. From the Dallas Commercial club President A. L. Martin and Secretary U. S. Loughery will be delegates to the Buena Vista meeting. Independence will have representatives at the meeting. There are many possibilities before the new organization, according to its sponsors, in the way of the general development of the Buena Vista district, as well as in the way of harmonious co-operation with the other clubs of the valley and of the county in bringing about the general development of the entire valley.—Dallas Observer.
