All Student Loans Have Been Repaid

For ten years a \$6,000 loan fund has been maintained at the University of Oregon, and the sums loaned to students range from smaller amounts up to \$150. In the ten years not a loss has been recorded. This can be said today, but could not have been said a few days ago.

Eight years ago a student was graduated from the university indebted to the loan to the amount of \$50. He was a native of Romania. As the trouble in the Balkans was going on at that time he sent for his name and brought them to America, supporting them as best he could. Years passed and the authorities heard no word from him. All expectations of keeping clean the non-loss record of the loan fund were given up.

But the unexpected happened. Yesterday a letter was received by President Campbell containing payment from this long-lost student. Instead of the awkward, stuttering, foreign youth he was when he entered the university, the youth is now a grown man and professor of sociology of one of the large middle west universities of the United States.—Eugene Register.
