Mexican Stocks Advance On News of Wilson's Stand

(Copyrighted 1916 by the New York Evening Post.) New York, Mar. 10.—It was not easy to interpret the markets attitude toward Washington's Mexican news today. The market had been advancing, though irregularly, when announcement of the proposed invasion was made. It neither advanced nor declined on the whole, though, as such action had been expected. In part the later hesitancy was perhaps attributable to the absence of confirmation of the report Carranza had agreed to the American plans, but later reports lent some color to that story.

Mexican stocks, including Mexican petroleum and American smelting, opened with fractional declines. These issues moved irregularly, but late in the afternoon too, a decided upward trend, Mexican issues advancing from two to five points.

All Kinds of Rumors, One That Carranza Is Dead

Washington, Mar. 10.—An unconfirmed rumor that General Venustiano Carranza was dead reached the state department today. Another report said he had been imprisoned by rebels at the outset of a new uprising. The state department is endeavoring to locate him. Early this afternoon all efforts had been unsuccessful.

New York, Mar. 10.—John Burns, Mexican consul general here, said today he had heard nothing with regard to the report of General Carranza's rumored death. United Press cables sent Carranza during the past 24 hours have remained unanswered.

Claim Ranch Is Resided. El Paso, Texas, Mar. 10.—Villistas raided an American ranch west of Columbus early today, murdering the owner, whose name is Hopp, according to a telephone message received here from J. B. Blair, prominent merchant of Columbus, N. M.

Saw Villista Troops. Columbus, N. M., Mar. 10.—Refugees arriving here this afternoon asserted Villista troops had been seen within 8 miles of the city. It was rumored they were preparing for another raid. Colonel Slocum discredited the story, but took every precaution.

Says Villa Is Returning. El Paso, Texas, Mar. 10.—J. B. Blair, prominent Columbus, N. M., merchant, telephoned a report this afternoon that General Villa with 2,000 men was reported moving to attack Columbus again. Blair said the town is excited. Residents are hiding in their adobe houses. The thirteenth cavalry has been ordered out to meet the expected attack, Blair asserted.

plans, "intervention" in or "invasion" of Mexico has not occurred and will not occur. The Mexican campaign promises to be merely against banditry. The future American policy, however, depends largely on General Carranza. Word from him is expected hourly. Mexican Representative Elise Ardenondo here indicated Carranza would not object to United States troops crossing the line and might welcome American aid in exterminating Villa. The administration had basis for a belief that Carranza's statement will declare Villa an outlaw against the American and Carranza governments, and a common enemy of both.

General Trevino, Carranzista commander in Chihuahua, is reported in pursuit of the Villistas. The report that Villa was wounded in the Columbus fight has not been confirmed. If the government decides only to wipe out the Columbus raiders, army men said that possibly not more than 1,000, and certainly not over 2,000 or 3,000 American soldiers would be sent into Mexico.

President Wilson's statement regarding his intended course regarding banditry along the Mexican border may be issued today, the White House indicated. It is considered certain, however, that it will declare against intervention.
