## First Congregational Installs New Pastor

The ceremonies of the installation as pastor of the Rev. James Elvin of the First Congregational church were in progress this afternoon and will be closed with services at the church this evening.

The council of the delegates from the East Willamette association of Congregational churches met this afternoon to receive the report of the call of Mr. Elvin to the Salem church and a statement from him of the fundamentals of his faith.

The evening services will include the entertaining of the delegates by the members of the Pilgrims' club, the showing of several moving pictures and the installation sermon by the Rev. Luther R. Day, of Portland.

Mr. Elvin was born in Patterson, N. J. in 1876 and was graduated from Dickinson college in 1902, from Boston university in 1905 and from the Pennington, N. J. university in 1908. He came to Seattle in 1909 where he was assistant pastor of the Plymouth church for four years. From Seattle he went to The Dalles, where he was pastor for two years. His work with the First Congregational church of this city began January 1, 1915.

## Industrial Survey of City Will Be Made

This evening at 8 o'clock E. D. Carpenter, merchandise manager of the Meier & Frank store, Portland, will address the members of the Commercial club, coming here through the invitation of the Business Men's League. After accepting the invitation, Mr. Carpenter wrote inquiring as to what kind of men were in the Commercial club. Upon being informed that the club represented all the business as well as professional men of the city, he decided to speak on co-operation.

Mr. Elliott came to Salem from Twin Falls, Idaho, where he had been superintendent of the schools several years. He is a graduate of the University of Iowa. During his two years' work here, he has done much for the schools of the city and in all the changes that have been made and in the establishment of the junior high schools, has had the approval of the entire school board.

Crislan and Walter Stolz; leather book binding and cover factory, George F. Rodgers and C. LaChelle; mineral paint factories, R. M. Hutcheson and Florian Von Eschen; woolen hosiery factory, R. C. Bishop and O. C. Locke; linen factory, W. M. Hamilton, Carl Abrams and Joseph H. Albert.

Washington, Mar. 14.—Benjamin F. Shively, United States senator from Indiana, died here today following an illness extending over several months. Ben J. P. Shively was just beginning his second term as senator when death claimed him.

## Two Cavalry Regiments Cross Border Tomorrow

Douglas, Ariz., March 14.—A column composed of the Seventh and Tenth United States cavalry and one battery of the Sixth field artillery will be ready to enter Mexico tomorrow morning from Culberson's ranch, sixty miles east of here, according to apparently reliable information from there this afternoon.

Three wagon loads of entrenching tools crossed from Douglas to Agua Prieta today for Carranza soldiers mobilizing at Cabullona, on the Neogari railroad, 18 miles south of the border.

Arrivals from Mexico report the Carranzistas at Cabullona are taking up defensive positions in the hills with the apparent intention of defense against any American advance south from Douglas.

General Calles remains at Agua Prieta. He asserts all American in his territory will be given protection, even in case of intervention. The international law as enforced in the United States will apply in Sonora, he said.
