**Army Will Enter Mexico Probably Friday Morning**

Troops from Cheyenne, Fort Leno, Fort Riley, San Francisco, Monterey, Chicago and Chattanooga are reported coming here. Officers believe that practically all the regular army will be used either on the border or in pursuing Villa within a fortnight. Before night it is expected fully 15,000 will be mobilized between El Paso and Nogales, ready for any service, and all anxious to "go in."

There are 2,000 soldiers at Columbus, and work is being rushed there on a new headquarters building for Brigadier General Pershing. Four thousand men probably will be concentrated there shortly.

In addition to the wireless and the aeroplane, the automobile branch of the army will receive its first real American war trial in this campaign. Scores of light and heavy trucks are being listed for transportation to the border to serve as supply trains when the long "hike" into the bandit country begins. Civilian chauffeurs will probably drive them.

Guarding Border Towns.

While the mobilization of Carranzistas and Americans has driven Villa from the border region, vigilance on the United States side is greatly increased since the Columbus raid. Light and water plants close to the international line are closely guarded. Nearly every foot of railway track striking the boundary is patrolled by uniformed sentries.

With only single track railroads paralleling the border to the west, the absence of strategic railways for mili-

lary concentration is frequently commented on. The delay in arrival of some American regiments from the interior is explained by the lack of rolling stock, to move the troops immediately.

As fast as new companies arrive they are distributed "somewhere on the border" according to General Foxton's secret orders.

The quartermasters' corps is working day and night keeping a steady stream of supplies flowing toward the many camps. Columbus has become a vast city of tents almost over again. In only a few cases have new arrivals been forced to use their shelter tents or "dog tents" as the soldiers call them. A neatly entered into routine camp life.

Members of the "Fighting Thirtieth," some still bearing marks of their clash with Villa, are repeatedly asked to tell their stories. In cavalry drills many an imaginary Villista head has fallen in wild charges.

Carranza's attitude is unknown but he is not expected to object further. Under reports that the Carranzistas are mobilizing and threatening resistance were declared by officials to be exaggerated. While they were not sure the Carranzistas would co-operate in the huge manhunt, they did not think the "first chief's" men would be ordered to actively oppose American progress.
