Utah Wool Sold.

More than 80 per cent of the wool cellip of Utah has been contracted by buyers from eastern houses and prices paid for 11,200,000 pounds under contract range from 21 to 28 cents, according to Dr. S. W. McChre, secretary of the National Woolgrowers, association. says the Sait Lake Herald-Republican Dr. McClure said yesterday the clip in Utah this year will average as wel as last year and that there would be as fast year and that there would be less shrinkage on account of heavy snows during the winter. He says that in Idaho 15 per cent of the wool clip has been contracted, in Nevada about 60 per cent, in Montina about 5 per cent and in Wyoming about 5 per cent. The lambing season is almost over in some sections of Idaho and within a short time shipments will commence.
