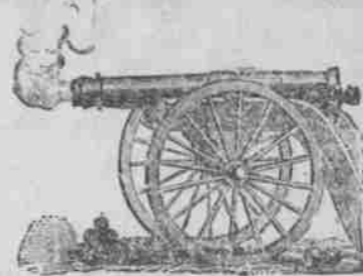


On the War Path

One naturally enjoys the singing of a trained chorus but the concert last night was doubly enjoyable from the fact that the best of Salem was represented and also to the fact that Prof. Mendelsohn had his singers well in hand.

"The Hymn of Praise" include several of Mendelsohn's best known compositions. The solo parts were effectively taken by A. A. Sebraman who did such good work when "Elijah" was given about a year ago, and Mrs. Myrtle Long Mendelsohn.

"The Crusaders" was more dramatic in general musical effect and therefore won approval and quick response from the audience. The solo parts were taken by Mrs. Myrtle Long Mendelsohn, S. G. Sargent, R. M. Jones, A. A. Sebraman and Miss Ruth Fugate.

While classical music does not ordinarily appeal to the public in general, last night may be considered an exception as not only was the singing given on the closest of attention, but the audience showed its appreciation by enthusiastic encores.

Mrs. William Burghardt, Jr. is an accomplished accompanist. Responding closely to the baton of the conductor, her work on the piano was largely responsible for the desired dramatic effects, and for the general effective work of the soloists as well as chorus.
