LONDON HAS WAR SCARE
London, Mar. 24.—If the German fleet comes out, transports carrying troops for the invasion of England may accompany it, the News and Star suggested today. They warned the public that reports of 17 U-boats aboard the Kaiser's war vessels were probably true. Such a move would outrage anything carried by British battleships.
The newspapers declared army headquarters realized this danger and was keeping large forces of soldiers in England to meet such an attack. The Star asserted German submarines were torpedoing neutral vessels to keep them from reporting the mobilization of German transports.
