**SAY THE RAILROAD WILL BE RUSHED**  
Salem to Bend Road Will Be Constructed Without Least Delay

The surveying for the Salem to Bend railroad through Stayton is progressing as fast as the weather will permit. A competent corps of engineers, with C. O. Williamson as chief engineer is hard at work on the permanent or location survey, and will reach Mohama tonight.

As soon as Mill City is reached with this survey, Mr. Williamson and Mr. John Hulbert, draughtsman, will get out the blue prints and profiles, which work is expected to be finished by April 1.

While the office work on the blue prints is going ahead the engineers will go over the line the third time in order to locate it in reference to the set-in corners, etc. This will complete the survey until the actual construction commences.

Mr. M. Lynott, who has complete charge of the work, stated positively to a representative of the Mill that day that his instructions were to complete the work on the grading as soon as possible, which will be later than May, and to complete the grade cutting in Mill City within 90 days from that date.

In the meantime as soon as the engineers are released from the first section Salem to Mill City, they will open up a camp beyond the lumber town and push the work over the summer as soon as the snow is gone.—Stayton Mail.

**John D. Guiss Bound to Get His Old Claim**

John D. Guiss, a brother-in-law of F. Cooke Patton, is banking in the line right in Portland just at present, and will continue to bank for several days and nights. Saturday, April 1, filing will be received for the opening of the Siletz Indian lands in Lincoln county. First, come first served, and under the rulings whoever lines up for filing money stay with the job day and night, either in person or by proxy.

A Portland paper says: "John D. Guiss, who is first in line by virtue of having taken his place Wednesday night, remained there Wednesday night and was relieved yesterday morning by his wife. Mrs. Guiss brought her lunch with her and contented herself throughout the day by knitting. Her husband replaced her again last night. They will continue this alternate day-and-night vigil until the final drawing is made. They originally settled on a quarter section several years ago and spent \$4000 in protecting their claim before the land was withdrawn. Then they lost title to it. Now they will file on the same tract.

**Herrera Will Never Go Back On Carranza**

Douglas, Ariz., Mar. 23.—Governor P. Elias Galles, of Sonora, today received a message from General Luis Herrera at Chihuahua city branding as false the reports that he had retreated to Villa.

"I am loyal to our first chief Carranza," the message said, "and will fight Villa to the end."

General Gutierrez and Civil Governor Durques also sent messages to Galles denying Herrera's defection.

The arrival of 200 Mayo Indians at Agua Prieta last night led to reports that a Mexican troop movement to this section was afoot. It was charged today that the report was unfounded.

**A DARING HOLD UP**  
Tacoma, Wash., Mar. 23.—Police and detectives are searching today for three men who perpetrated the mauling holdup in many months last evening when they rifled the cash register of a St. Helens avenue drug store after binding the two clerks with ropes. The bandits were unmasked. They were frightened out of the store before they had finished their work of looting the place, by the aggressive actions of a fox terrier dog belonging to a woman passing the store. The dog pursued the trio for two blocks.

The robbers secured about \$50 in cash.
